First Class and Air Mail requires City/State/Date handstamp.

Hazardous items including: shingles, bricks, children, and more were eventually banned from mailing by the USPOD due to hazards to employees.

Children being mailed were banned after two were mailed on R.P.O.'s in 1911. (They were "bag tagged"...not boxed!) A bank was mailed, brick-by-brick, in the 1930's. The brick maker found $4^{\text {th }}$ Class postage was cheaper than trucking!

THE ROYAL NETHERLANDS MARINE CORPS.
In December of 1944 Royal Dutch Marines arrived at Canp Lejeune for training. Their homeland was destroyed under Nazi occupation and they had no place to drill. The Royal Dutch Marines were the first complete military organization trained on American soil. They wore Complete mulitary arganization trained on American ses.

The Dutch marines settled in Hadnot Point, an all-white camp. The American marines at Hadnot Point for whatever reason picked on and fought with the Dutch marines. Finally, the commanding officer and fought with the Dutch marines. Finally. the commanding offocer
had to move them (the Dutch) to Montford Point camp. a segregated camp for Blacks. The Dutch marines were fully accepted as brothers by the Blacks. Friendships grew as they were invited into their homes and they went on picnics and outings with the Black marines and their families. They finished their training about a year later and went on to the East Indies.


Note: Overseas M.P.Os (ie.: APO 757 in Neurenbers. Germany acted as it were mainland US. P.O. facility using prevailing US stamps to mail in/to and from using existing US. mail rates to and from, or within a foreign sion of the Unitive continues today under the auspicies and workings of the Universal Postal Union, a dive sion of the United Nations.
