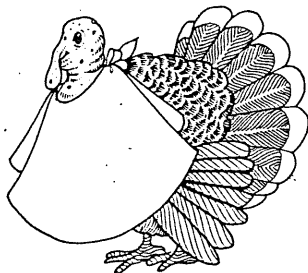
FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

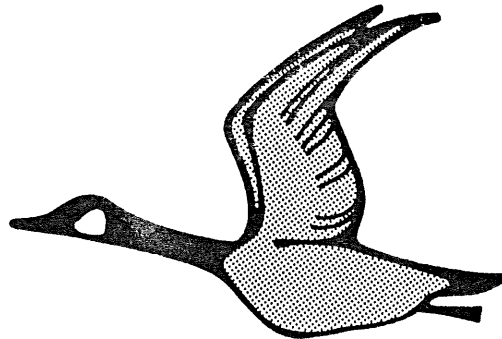
