



The Stamp Market Index Bill Snyder

You've heard of the CPI-the Consumer Price Index. The CPI tells us in a very general way how the prices of the goods

and services we use change from month to month and year to year. The CPI is also important in that the 12-month percentage change in the Index is used to compute the annual increases in Social Security benefits, in federal and state pension plans, and in many private sector retirement plans. In recent years the CPI has not changed much-it was up about 1% in 2002meaning that inflation is low.

Not to be outdone, the U.S. stamp market has its own version of the CPI-the Stamp Market Index. The SMI has been compiled

monthly since 1983, with an extension back to 1970, by Linn's, the weekly stamp newspaper. The overall SMI has three sub indices: a 19th Century index; a 20th Century index; and a US Airmails index. The SMI depicts changes in the price of fine-very fine stamps-as opposed to stamps in poor or superb condition.

In general terms, the SMI increased about nine-fold between 1970 and 1980-81. Since 1981 the SMI has declined somewhat and is now roughly seven times 1970 prices. The trend over the past year, perhaps reflecting the sluggish American economy, has been down: 19th Century stamps fell by about 3.4%, airmails by over 9%, and 20th Century by about 2.0%. At the same time, Linn's reports, demand for fine or better grades of 19th Century stamps and for nicely centered airmail stamps remains strong.

If your US collection was purchased before 1970, and consists of high quality stamps, it should be worth substantially more than you paid for it. Better quality stamps, Linn's reports, and especially 19th Century items, command from 70 to 85% of Scott catalog values. Stamps with average centering or some faults, in contrast, go for substantial discounts to catalog values. But keep in mind the advice of many experienced collectors: collect stamps because of the joy you receive from your collection-and any financial gain is strictly incidental! Phil-a-tolling Arcund 1

APS News

Janet Klug, an Ohio resident and columnist for Linn's Stamp News, was elected President of the American Philatelic Society on 7 June 2003. At the time of her election, Klug was chair of the APS board of vice president. She is the first woman to hold the presidency in the APS's 117 year history. The 2003 election was important for another reason: It provided clear evidence that members strongly support the society's decision to make the renovated 19th century match factory building in Bellefonte, PA, the new APS headquarters. Indeed, with the single exception of Klug, all APS directors who had opposed the move to the match factory were defeated in this election.

Fewer than one in five APS members voted in the election-despite the fact that several candidates spent heavily on advertising.

Klug and the new board will be sworn in on 9 August at the APS Stampshow 2003 in Columbus, Ohio.






