Book Review

Niels H. Bundgaard, (2005). *The Ugly Duckling: Hans Christian Andersen and Danish Stamps*. Published by AFA-Forlaget in Otterup, Denmark. This book is distributed by Nordfirm.

Many of us older Americans, I am sure, can name some of Hans Christian Andersen's (1805-1875) fairy tales from our youth such as *The Little Match Girl*, *The Ugly Duckling*, and *The Little Mermaid*, to name a few. So it would seem like a lead pipe cinch for the poet's home country to honor him with a stamp, wouldn't it?

However, it took from 1925 to 1935 to produce an issue related to Denmark's poetry legend, Hans Christian Andersen. Through politics, bureaucracy, delays, etc., they missed the 50th Anniversary of his death in 1925, and then they missed the 125th of his birth in 1930. But they wanted to get it right at all levels of approval, after all! It is an interesting story that could be told about postal administrations the world over.

The set finally issued was the result of a contest, and it included an illustration from *The Ugly Duckling*, 5øre, *The Little Mermaid*, 10øre, and four other stamps with HC Andersen's portrait, 7-15øre. ↓



Currently the set remains a popular one, but at the time of issue, it was met with much derision in the press as to stamp design, quality, timelines, and others.

The '35 issue got the ball rolling, however slowly, and in 1953 a three-stamp set was issued late for the 150th anniversary of his death. There were future issues in the '60s, '80s, and '90s. The 1930 Danish Christmas seal saw *The Little Match Girl*, and the 1975 Christmas Seals contained eighteen images of his paper cuttings. 2005 saw a Danish birth bicentennial issue, and other postal entities participated including Alderney, Hong Kong, Jersey, Belgium, Singapore, Germany, Marshall Islands, and China.

2017 Open House Leads to Much Sharing

The 2017 Open House and Exhibits event went very well. The walls were covered with stamps of all sorts, covers, maps, letters, and other treasures of 12 exhibitors that covered 20 topics. The 55 in attendance may have been a modern record for PSLC. There were visitors and new members present. In fact tonight was the first meeting for our newest member, **Thomas Nichols**, and he participated in the exhibits! Special snacks were prepared by Open House planner **Len Kasper** along with **Fred Sargent** and **Fred Mackey**.

Following a short business meeting, Len and Paul introduced the two presenters. **Al Schaub** discussed "*Philatelic opportunities for new and seasoned collectors alike.*" **Dave Hunt** provided an illustrated "*Introduction to errors, freaks, and oddities.*"

One (or more) Page exhibits were lively with great presenter and audience engagement.

Mike Bach discussed the 4

May 1813 cover and letter he purchased, with historical significance related to Peninsular War.



Dennis Bouchard is collecting service organizations on stamps, and this year he has emphasized The Lions Club.

Joy Bouchard displayed her topicals relating to the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation.

Dr. Charles DiComo described historical content and the markings and travels of a most interesting 1839 stampless cover from London, Canada to Scotland.

Lucy Eyster collects unusual stamps, and her theme tonight was thermographic stamps on cover, some related to the recent 21 August '18 U.S. eclipse.

Dave Hunt had three exhibits including ♦Latvian stamps on map. ♦Stamps on paper currency; and ♦A U.S. postage due bill which was franked with \$310.29 in postage due stamps!

Hal Klein displayed ♦early machine cancels; ♦Lebanon County postal history emphasizing Mt. Gretna, Chautauqua, and Indian-town Gap; and ♦ "The Postmaster's Daughter on Postcards."

Dennis Milliken had a collector's U.S. type set of pennies from 1782 through 2009.

With covers, issues, and blocks, **Thomas Nichols** discussed the evolution, denominations, varieties, and uses of the U.S. DC4 red-pink Skymaster airmail stamps of 1946 to 1949 and later uses with some printing and cover variations.

RD Noble had three exhibits posted by Hal Klein including the ♦1st edition of U.S. revenue stamps; ♦Precancelled stamps; and ♦Varieties of playing card stamps.

Paul Petersen had ♦Twenty-two different slogan cancels on U.S. Scott 2116 (See pg.-1); ♦A 12 May 1940 censored cover and letter from RF to NJ with commentary on the Nazi invasion; ♦A Bermuda stamp which paid the tax on a 1955 residential electricity bill.

George Younes collects many things "space race" related. Tonight he had covers, ball caps, FDCs, stamps, headlines, photos, and others, many framed.

But his favorites were with the Boy Scouts, especially the many summer camps and his twenty full-time years with the Pennsylvania Department of Weights and Measures where he retired a few years back.

Last month John was elected the club's 2nd vice president and will move to 1st VP in '18. As he enjoyed leadership roles at Lancopex and the picnic, he is likewise anticipating board membership next year allowing him a greater opportunity to serve his stamp club.

Musings: I have a lot to learn about collecting postal history, Part-II

In Part-1 last month, I described an old RF cover that I had purchased thinking it was possibly from the 1870-1 Franco Prussian War, with censor tape tied by censor stamp. This was franked with a Blue Ceres definitive stamp, the stamps used from 1849 into the mid-1870s. Had I had a modicum of knowledge about French philately, and the Ceres stamps in particular, I would have realized that according to Scott, these stamps were reproduced from 1938-1940 (335-340) but with much higher denominations. That ultramarine 2.25fr stamp on my cover should have been the biggest tip-off that I did not have a 19th Century cover. The denominations of the older Ceres series never exceeded 1fr. According to **Dick Colberg** with his *Yvette & Teillier Catalog*, the modern series ran from 1937-1941. The 2.25fr is Y&T# 375A.



So what about my cover? The censor stamp looked like those on my WWI covers. The cancel date was unreadable. There was an oval

military stamp. I needed help. Dick Colberg had sent information on the oval marking to **Hal Klein** from a reference work at the Collector's Club in NYC. With this information along with a scan of my cover, Hal went to work with his special scanner to give me more information about my cover as follows.

Cancel information: Hal read the date as 18 April 1939, and the FLE in the postmark is Fleurance in the Department of Gers, just north of the Pyrenees Mountains on the Spanish border.

Double Oval Censor Mark: This particular mark was used in 1939-1940. ↓



Postal Control Commission mark: This is a black censor mark tying the censor tape to the cover on both front and back sides. ↓



What else do we know about this cover? It was mailed 18 April 1939 to Werner Manheim of 2655 Highland Ave. in Cincinnati, OH. This was four and a half months before the start of WWII.

So why was there censoring of French mail leaving the country 4.5 months before the 1 September start of WWII in 1939 with the invasion of Poland?

Hal adds some background information regarding the diplomatic and military relationship of France and Germany. There were several wars between them since the 1870-1 Franco Prussian War. Now Hitler was threatening all of Europe, and by April of 1939 there was Nazi occupation of the Saar Basin, Austria, Lithuania, and Czechoslovakia. This was all following Germany's violation of the Treaty of Versailles with significant rearmament and more. Censorship was fairly common,

Hal notes. It was a way of knowing what was going on, and it could prevent problems. The U.S. did some censoring before WWII. Because France was censoring mail in April of 1939, she knew war was coming. The more information she could get beforehand, the better. Another question is "Why two censor marks?" Two organizations, both associated with military intelligence censored the mail. This is a topic for a separate article.



So what was my cover? It was a censored private letter from an unknown writer in southern France to Mr. Manheim in Cincinnati.

There was no letter content, but with modern technology I was able to find a current image of his address in Ohio. It looks like a suburban multi-family dwelling. Though interesting, it sheds no further light on the cover at hand. Ed ☒
