Memberships in ATA approved by club

At the June meeting, club members voted to give a membership in the American Topical Association (ATA) to each of three youth members.

It was also reported that the 2012 ATA convention would be held in Lancaster, PA.

The ATA is a great organization and one of the healthiest of all stamp organizations due to the fact that topical collecting is growing in popularity.

Perhaps the most valuable member benefits is the dozens and dozens of lists of stamps by topic that are available for member purchase at twenty cents a page.

If nothing else, visit the website of the ATA and compare the number of stamps issued by topic, which can be estimated by the number of pages on each list.

For example, I found it odd that all the worldwide stamps relating to Natural History Museums fit on two pages, but Mona Lisa alone needs three pages.

Incredibly, the topic of Hippopotamus requires five pages and Elvis nine pages.

These topics are dwarfed by Dinosaurs-Fossils, which takes up 86 pages.

The ATA costs \$25 annually and the mailing address is P. O. Box 8, Carterville, IL 62918-0008.

Topical collecting is one way an individual can chew off a bite-size chunk of the three million stamps that have been issued.
