TOO LATE, SMART!

In this year of Our Lord, 1998, we are celebrating the 60th anniversary of the Lancaster Philatelic Society. There is no charter member left to tell of its birth, but when 60 years I mentioned, become is autobiographical and start to recall what I was doing back then. I was no longer sending dimes and pennies to stamp approval companies. My time was occupied with studies for my final year at Vanderbilt University and working at Radio Station WSM in the afternoons and evenings. Also at the age of 22, I found girls more interesting than adhesives. They were in superb condition and their perfs were well rounded. Their only fault was that they didn't want to be cancelled.

What if I, or you, back then had spent a bit of time buying what we today call Classics? I decided to do some research and with the aid of TRUDY GREINER FOUNDATION, gathered the information I needed it was all in a 1937 Scott Catalog. If you are not made ill by munching on the noshes I will offer you at meeting, April you will certainly feel a pang of remorse from what I am about to show you. How happy and richer you would be, if you had bought the following at 1937 prices and held them until today.

The British Guiana 1 penny magenta was still expensive back then, cataloged at \$50,000, used - no mint copy ever found. Today's prices if you have to ask, you are not a Rockefeller or a Dupont. You would have done well, had you obtained a loan and purchased the Sweden 3 shilling yellow error for \$9,000 in 1937. In 1996 it sold at auction for \$2,270,000. An upside Jenny listed at \$3,750 in 1937 sold for \$198,000 in 1982. It cost 3 cents to mail a letter, still in 1937.
