

Anyone who enjoyed the experience in an outhouse knows it was more than three sheets to the wind.


Norman Zimmerman's March presentation offers bath room humor on the light side.



Who Was There First?

Postcards and the Public Chose Sides

Robert Edwin Peary


b. May 6,1856, Cresson, PA., d. Feb. 20,1920, Wash, D.C.

Peary enlisted in the U. S. Navy in 1881 and was given several leaves of absence to explore the Arctic. On several trips incl. companionship of his wife, Matthew Henson, Frederick A. Cook and native Eskimo tribesmen, he discovered areas of north Greenland and the Canadian Northwest Territories. His third attempt to reach the North Pole was successful on April 6, 1909 but Cook's claim to have preceded him with a





Six of these seven PCs were mailed. All have dates from 1909 to 1911 - at the time the world was celebrating the recent discovery of the North Pole – but by whom? It depended on whom you wished to believe. Whose story in the papers was most plausible? The add-on fur wrapped Peary (above) was mailed in Brooklyn on Oct.30, 1909 - to scare someone? Jules Deutsch's pencil sketches are upper right corner. None of the cards' messages make reference to the famous figures. Whose side might you have chosen in 1909?




1908 N.P. discovery marred Peary's enjoyment of triumph well beyond WWI. Rear Adm. Peary retired in 1911 and completed two books of polar exploration.


Frederick Albert Cook

b. 610/1865, Hortonville, N.Y., d. 8/.5/1940, New Rochelle, NY


Cook practiced medicine then achieved fame as an explorer, first on Peary's third expedition to the North Pole than by leading others on climbs of Mt. McKinley. Cook claimed to reach the N.P. in 1908 but Eskimo companians later accounts left Cook hundreds of miles short of the goal, photographs withstanding. Public support for Cook waned after World War I. He was later found guilty of mail fraud. After six years in prison he was paroled in 1929. He was given a presidential pardon by FDR in 1940 at age 75.










CUBISM

Last month's Cross-Stitch PCs by Ellen Clapsaddle are found on International and Gibson PCs and so similar to these cubist-influenced cards by Stecher we felt they should be shown in successive issues of THE CARD. The Easter set is #500, the Valentine set is #514.

According to the Britannica, the Cubist Movement can be attributed to painter Henry Matisse and critic Louis Vauxcelles c.1908. The period between 1910 and 1912 (when Stecher PCs were being published) is often referred to as that of Analytical Cubism. Rightangles and straight-line construction were favored.

Fortunately (in this writer's opinion) Stecher's artists chose a simplistic cubism; Picasso's ugly cubist tangent that had to be studied to be understood - never made it to postcards.

Elysian Bower A Paradise to the Brubaker Family

2544 Fruitville Pike is in the heart of current building development. This Grand Dame on the west side of a busy thoroughfare could succomb at any time.

In 1912 the M. G. Brubaker family published a number of real photo PCs to commemorate their home's 100th anniversary.

The three views we show plus a fourth, very similar to the close-up of the Bower, have captions drawn on to their negatives - the white lettering. Two of PCs show the 1812-1912 dates. A reasonable assumption would be the other two were printed at the same time (all four have identical AZO stamp boxes – 4 pyramids up, indicating paper stock made Aug.1907 to Oct.1912.




Two additional RPs have the same AZO box while a seventh card has a Velox stamp box, issued Aug. 1907 to Oct. 1910.

Those must have been wonderful times – when the processsion of pony carts and children played about.

I can recall passing the entrance 30 years ago and seeing those small birch trees (fenced in on the Entrance photo) had reached and passed their prime. Storm after storm blew across the fields in the 1970s and the aged birches fell over one by one like two long rows of ten pins.

When I interviewed the residents about seven years ago, a young Brubaker had moved back into the home with his family. They had dim hopes of ever returning the homestead to its former self. We can only wish that the Elysian Bower lives to see its birthday #200.

Deck of Local Postcard Playing Cards

Where in the world would you find 52 postcard views transcribed onto a set of playing cards? – in Lancaster, Pennsylvania, that's where!

The cards were produced at the Faesig Print Shop when it was located on Penn Square in the southwest corner which most of us know as the home of the Conestoga Bank.

A Brief Biography

Frank Faesig's 1887 print shop was at 22 Market St. He had entered the job printing field ten years earlier. He then lived just a few blocks away at 141 S. Prince. In the 1898 city directory his title was Manager of Market Street Printing. His residence was now 628 E. King St. where Henry S. Gruger also lived.

By 1919 there was a Frank Faesig estate, the print shop had relocated to the very center of town, at 32 Penn Square (we know it as the Conestoga Bank corner) and Henry Gruger was manager of the Faesig estate as well as the Faesig Print Shop. Its work was Job, Book and Commercial Printing. Gruger still lived at 628 E. King St. Faesig's widow, Cecelia, now boarded there.

Henry Gruger continued operating the print shop into the 1930s at its last location,140 E. Grant St.

The Landis Art Press Connection

In 1891 the Landis Art Press moved to 38 E. Chestnut St. where it expanded its business to include <u>Professional Card, Commercial Printing and Paper Stock Die Cuts.</u> It was from this building David Bachman Landis and his son Elvin produced the 120+postcard views with which many of us are familiar. Most of the Landis Art Press postcards were photographs DBL took and produced as cards between 1907 and 1912.


It may very well be that by the late teens Landis (who must have known and been a friend of Gruger) decided to sell/offer/allow so many of his views to be used on the unique deck of playing cards. Notice the final line on the back of the complimentary cards reads "these views (are) for sale". The Penn Square outlet would have benefited DBL as well as his friend Gruger in the sale of Landis' surplus stock. This is supposition, however. Research is needed here.

Elvin Landis continued his father's business at the E. Chestnut St. address after DBL died in 1940.


Although the Landis views comprise most (30) of the set's views, we might consider, too, that local merchant lke Steinfeldt also gave approval to use 21 cards with views he had printed by Curt Teich and Commercialchrome, two national postcard companies. The 52nd card was by local publisher, L. B. Herr

General Information

The views on the playing cards were printed in orange, green, brown, blue, purple and black. All of the captions and pips are printed in black. We've seen only two such complete sets of these unusual postcard playing cards sets. Both surfaced about eight years ago. Any information our readers can offer as to the sets, variations, etc. we would be happy to share in the near future.



Shown full size is the advertisement back found on all 53 playing cards (Joker included).




Postcard Artists were also Illustrators of Children's Books







featuring unusual postcards that were actually mailed and delivered.

Tom has written on the front right edge that he's "expecting a letter" from Bride "every day". The add-on is a packet of real shamrock seed - seen much less often than the salt bags from Great Salt Lake in Utah. The paper sack is glued to the PC and was produced by The NPO (Northern Publishing Office) in Belfast, Ireland. Feb. 19,1907 is the posted date at Castlebar, (castle in coat of arms) the small capital of County Mayo, Miss Bride Devereux was in the Manhattan State Hospital on Ward's Island, New York, USA.
