- More than 120,000 Japanese and persons of Japanese ancestry living in western U.S. moved to "relocation centers," some for the duration of the war (Executive Order 9066).
- Coconut Grove nightclub fire in Boston kills 491.
- Women's military services established.
- Kaiser Foundation Health Plan, first health maintenance organization (HMO), begins in Oakland, Calif.

In 1942 booklet plates were changed to the Type II 'new design' plates with a 2.5 mm vertical gutter. This plate change was first used in the re-issuing of the Thomas Jefferson 3 cent Violet (807a) stamp on March 8th, 1942. The 807a was previously issued on January 27th, 1939 with a 3 mm vertical gutter.


Kentucky Statehood - 3¢ Violet issue date June 1, 1942. Issued to commemorate Kentucky's 150th anniversary of statehood. Pictures a mural by Gilbert White from the capitol building in Frankfort. The stamp shows Daniel Boone and three others looking across the Kentucky River to the shore where Frankfort, the capitol city, is located.







Win the War - 3¢ Violet issue date July 4,1942. The "Win the War" stamp was issued on the anniversary of American independence to bolster American support of the World War II effort.









China Resistance - 5¢ Bright Blue issue date July 7, 1942. This stamp was issued to commemorate the fifth anniversary of China's resistance against the Japanese Empire in the early days of World War II. The 5¢ denomination would have paid for a first-class letter to China. The stamp pictures Abraham Lincoln and Dr. Sun Yat-sen. Sun is considered the father of the Republic of China and was the country's first president.
