




Charles Lindbergh 80th Anniversary Solo Trans Atlantic Flight

Charles Lindberg, known after his flight as 'Lucky Lindy,' was the first person to cross the Atlantic Ocean on a solo flight. He flew from Roosevelt Airfield in Garden City, New York, to Paris (Le Bourget Airport) on May 20- May 21 1927 in 33.5 hours. His plane was the single-engine aircraft, 'The Spirit of St. Louis.' It was designed by Donald Hall and custom built by Ryan Aeronautical Company of San Diego, California. (His grandson Erik Lindbergh repeated this trip 75 years later in 2002 in 17 hours 17 minutes.)

Today air flights are so common that it's hard to imagine just eighty years ago this was such a tremendous feat. Technology in aeronautics like so many area have expanded exponentially. The President of France gave him the French Legion of Honor and back in the USA President Calvin Coolidge gave him the Distinguished Flying Cross. He also won the 'Orteig Prize' of \$25,000 which was offered in 1919 by New York hotelier Raymond Orteig for the first non-stop flight from New York to Paris. Others attempted the feat earlier but were not successful.



His feat put him instantly in the spot light were he became a voice on behalf of aviation. In later years Lindbergh took an active role in the environmental movement.

Lindbergh married Anne Morrow, who was apparently the only woman he asked out on a date, in 1929. Their child Charles Lindbergh II, 20 months old, was abducted from their home in 1932. A nationwide search ensued but the child was eventually found dead. After this catastrophe and the ensuing trial the family (In total they had 6 children) moved to Europe and later to Hawaii to escape public notice.

Charles Lindbergh died in Hawaii in 1974 when he was 72 years old.

About the cover cards: All four Halloween cards are unmarked as to publisher or printer. Two are postmarked 1909, one 1911, and the last was unused.




Tombstone – Cemetery Postcards By Bryan S. Benner




Above: Real Photo, D.B., Velox stamp box, unused. Quite the marker the McCredy's have, looks like a giant chess piece!

Left: Real Photo, postmarked 1913, D.B. View of 'Haldy Marble/ granite Works' which was on South Queen St. in Lancaster, PA


Message to – Miss Clara L. Keen on Plum St. in Lancaster, PA.
