




ACTIVITY AT ZELTENREICH'S

Recently, the Zeltenreich United Church of Christ has seen a burst of activity at the intersection of Peters Road and Hollander Road in Earl Township. Last year the congregation celebrated its 275th anniversary, and the church was in the news again this spring because its parking lot was the ideal location to view a pair of nesting bald eagles. There was even more activity at this location 100 years ago!

The original church property was donated by Andrew Seltenreich, and a simple frame structure was erected at the site. By the end of the 18th century the congregation outgrew the building and decided to move to a more central location in New Holland. The second building was completed in 1800, and the congregation became known as "The German Reformed Church of New Holland". By 1840 the primary language spoken in most local households was English, so the church leaders voted to revise the worship service from German to English. Not everyone agreed with this decision. The English speaking New Holland church eventually became known as St. Stephen United Church of Christ. Many of the congregation who preferred German moved back to the original church site south of New Holland and built the structure profiled in this article.

By 1907 the church was ready for another expansion. The plan was to first demolish the old structure, and then construct a new building on the western portion of the property. Why did they not continue to worship in the old building until the new structure was completed? The answer was found in the May 18, 1907 issue of the New Holland Clarion . . . "Much of the old material is to be used in the erection of the new building."

The structure built 100 years ago looks the same today. If you visit the church to attend services or go bird watching, walk to the northeast end of the parking lot and look closely at the grassy section. The outline of the foundation of the building that was demolished in May of 1907 is still visible!

Deutsch on Lancaster Views

Without *The Card's* unofficial translator, Gisela Withers, this little article would have been impossible. Thank you, Gisela.

We all know there was a heavy influx of Germans to south central Pennsylvania, and in particular, the Lancaster community in the latter part of the nineteenth century. Large neighborhoods of Germans were created in the southeast and southwest sections of the city.

Here are several views with their deutsch (German) messages and Gisela's welcomed translations.


Almshouse (Lancaster postmark, Dec. 1905; mailed to Altoona, PA.) Literally: "My warmest greeting and luck in the New Year, D. Lec....(?)"

Stevens' High School (Lanc. PM Feb. 11,1906; mailed to West Vine St. in the city.) Literally: "Over all the mountain tops there is quiet." Loosely: "Quiet reigns over all the mountains." (Signed) George A. Lukel. Gisela reminds us this is the first line of one of Goethe's most famous poems - a lyrical gem.

Rocky Springs and Conestoga Creek. (The cancellation is not readable. The PC, with an undivided back, was mailed to another Altoona address.) "This evening we're going to the theater in Lancaster. Greetings, Mama."

North Queen Street. (Lanc. PM Sep. 2, 1924.) "My Dear Ones! Have just sent off the registered letter with the item we had discussed. Please answer when you receive it. Warmest greetings to you. Fred. Biehl."

Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church (Lanc. PM Sep. 10, 1911) Mailed to Val Gamber in Altoona c/o Tribune newspaper.) "Dear Valentine, Have rec'd. your greeting & am happy to hear that you are all well, which I'm sorry to say is not the case with me. Have lots of pains in my limbs & my eye haven't gotten better.....Rec'd. a letter from Miss B. She still hasn't sold & therefore can't come, for which we are sorry. I hope she will come this fall.....Your Aunt Barbara."
