

And, as you might expect from a teacher, we saw the wide interest this gal has in her varied holiday postcards, too! Thanks, Anne (with an E) from all of us.





AESOP'S FABLES

Some of us would have to count in decades how long ago it was we read any of Aesop's Fables.Or are you the one in a thousand who just read one to your grandchild?

Most museum postcards were (and are) collected for their beauty. And there's a world of difference between the museum PCs of 1920 and those of 1990! Color rules! But a set of woodcuts can lose none of its charm.

In fact, many old museum postcards (often available in dealers' 10¢-25¢ boxes - or in an old shoebox in the attic) can make a wonderful beginning for a child just getting its feet wet in our hobby.

COVERED BRIDGES ON POSTCARDS Part Two - Local Bridges

Comby in Landstra Parket Parke

Part One (May issue) introduced the use of WORLD GUIDE and KIPPHORN NUMBERS, with examples from Maine to Washington state.

Willows Bridge #38-36-43. Published by Lanc. County Postcard Club, 1990. Dynacolor #P57956. Full-color cards available at 25¢, 5/\$1, 100/\$17.

Early settlers located along the many streams in Lancaster County and immediately made use of the abundant water power to operate their mills which supplied the needs of the community. There were grist, flour, saw, hemp and carding mills as well as forges.

Improved roads were needed to reach the millers and smiths and COVERED BRIDGES filled the bill. Between 1800 and 1987 there were 124 bridges at different sites in our County. In actuality, there were many more bridges than 124 as many of these structures were entirely replaced at the same location after destruction by high water (and less frequently) high winds.

Today we boast more covered bridges within our borders than any other county in PA. - a total of 30 incl. two which span Lancaster and Chester Counties.

They have some common characteristics: triangle-shaped gable at the portal; narrow length-wise openings under the eaves; and 29 use the Burr truss system of support. Except for one, they are red with white portals.

A five-man crew is employed by Lancaster County to keep those bridges not on private property in good repair. The bridge at Colemanville was entirely rebuilt in 1990 for \$350,000. A modern concrete or steel bridge would cost \$1.5 million and look out of place in this beautiful wooded region.



Built in 1813 by Jonathan Walcott across the Susquehanna River to York County. Length was 5,690 ft. Burr truss;28 spans; 27 ft. above water; double lane. 1/8 mile upstream from present bridge. It was, and continues to be, the longest covered bridge in the world.

Richards & Eckman #1831/3 handtinted divided back PC.1834 piers also used for covered bridge #3 and RR bridge still visible. Howe truss:



No. 16-The First Bridge Columbia, Pa. Destroyed by Ice, 1832



Columbia, Pa. Bridge burned down during Civil War June 30, 1863.

Kl22 bridge with double-deck, canopy covered tow-path for mules to pull canal boats in each direction across Susquehanna River(more in a future article about canal postcards). K123 bridge also carried passenger trains between York and Lancaster after July 1870. RR bridge replaced it sans roof and siding.

Wrightsville, Pa. The Third Bridge across the Susquehanna River. 5390 feet long. Erected 1868-69. Destroyed by wind Sept. 30, 1896. Published, by G. S. Tinsley, Druggist.

A farmhand with a huge load of hay stopped at the entrance and remarked "I kin git it thru this end alright, but how the heck am I goin' to git it out that little end over there?" Deliberately arsoned Jan.20,1968, it was then the longest covered bridge (349 ft.) in the Middle Atlantic states.



#38-36-31 by Tecraft. B/W card shows Shearer's Mill Bridge when on Colebrook Rd. at Lanc.Junction. Note cow fencing which kept pastures separate over the stream. We used bridge rafters as jungle gyms and in winter shoveled in snow so horse-drawn sleighs could go thru.





Tomlin's 39435 is a painting by Louise Frank of the Wenger's Mill Bridge, #38-36-14 near Brownstown, (including artist license). Often called 'kissing bridges' they gave unmarried top-down buggy riders of the plain sect a few seconds of privacy.
