



MEMBERS IN THE NEWS








KUNZLER & CO.

A recent news article featuring the \$16 million expansion program of the city's oldest meat processor brought to mind the real photo postcard shown. The stamp box dates it between 1915 and 1927. By 1919 the founder, Christ Kunzler, Sr., had taken in partners Samuel Shubrooks and Paul Schmidt so we can't be sure it's not one of the three driving the meat wagon. Or perhaps, it's an employee. Both the wagon and the leather harness cover read Ch.Kunzler & Co. Additionally, the wagon sign

reads <u>Pure Meats and Meat Products</u>. It appears dalmations were not just 'fire house dogs'.

Kunzlers began their business on Manor Street in 1901 so they were too late for the Trade Card era (approximately 1870 to 1900. They might have had great advertisement postcards. Unfortunately for us collectors, as was the case with many businesses, they chose not to use that inexpensive advertising medium (at least your editor is unaware of any other Kunzler cards). Do YOU know of any?



3 HUGE KISSES FROM HERSHEY

During the past few years you've no doubt been aware of Hershey Foods' expanded advertising program. With a new product almost yearly, it's quite understandable. One of Hershey's most innovative ad campaigns is linked to its favorite charity.

The postcard shows their giant KISSMOBILE (not unlike the weinermobile of another company). The back of the PC explains "during its travels across America, the KISSMOBILE raises money" and awareness for Hershey's long-standing charity partner, Children's Miracle

Network...All proceeds from the sale of this postcard benefit CMN".

The Hershey Food Corporation copyright and CMN logo appear on the reverse but there's no indication of the printer.

*Ruth Moyer says the PCs sell for 50¢ and she got hers in Hershey the last week of May just before the Kissmobile left for a candy show in Chicago. If you live near the Hershey chocolate factory you may wish to check on the availability of the PCs. Please let us know.

HOMES of MOVIE STARS

Decadence and Hollywood have been bedfellows for generations. Recently former screen star Marlon Brando scorched Tinseltown with a verbal brand of his own and few weeks ago the Southern Baptists placed a decadent label on Disney. (Minnie and Mickey would blush if they sat in the audience of today's Disney feature films.)

Though sex and violence were always there, the films of the 1930's and 1940's dished out the vices in smaller doses. Stars from those "Golden" days can be found on postcards labeled "Home of..., "Residence of...".



LCPC staffer Gerald Hostetter started his collection about a year ago looking for cards with the homes and the star's picture. He has since expanded to PCs of the homes only as they are more numerous. Of the 134 examples he has, only 44 include the miniature portraits which, no doubt, account for the latter being at the upper end of the \$1-\$4 range. This is still an inexpensive way to collect and reminisce with stars of the Golden Age of Hollywood.

We have made no attempt to separate the numerous series by publishers, but, instead offer a numerical listing of Gerry's cards to give you an idea of what you might find. Many of the missing numbers in the series (and there must be hundreds) can be attributed to Hollywood related subjects like "The Floor of Fame", illustrated. The cards include mostly linens, some white borders and fewer than ten chromes.






EXHIBIT WINNERS

Postcard Exchanges Early International Correspondence

An article in the excellent British publication, Picture Postcard Monthly concerned the minority religion, Parsis or Parsees. I shortly delved into a dealer's box of Indian PCs and became even more interested in the messages on a number of cards. Collectors were exchanging on an international level. The PCs were dated from 1910 to 1913 and mailed to Miss Minnie Aborn of Worcester, MA.

Some of the more interesting excerpts are included for your reading pleasure.


July 12,1910. Please excuse my not writing to you but I am in hospital with Malarial Fever...This is an old Hindu temple...nearly all the natives are heathens and worship idols of stone and wood. A group of natives are listening to a priest. The people pay him enormous sums if they do anything wrong.


Aug.22,1910.This is reckoned to be the biggest hotel in India.It is where most of the British officers stop.

Jan.22,1911. The biggest part of Benares is forbidden to white people. It is a cheap place for silk... about 12¢ a yd. July 9,1912. Are these postcards of what you want? Sorry I have none in color. I have sent different people in Boston PCs and find they have not sent me any in return. I shall very much like Boston views. I will leave it to your good judgement... from George

Sept.1,1912. Dear Postal Friend, Thank you very much for your cards. I am sending you the only two I could get of Arabia and other of Benares of which I can get several. Foreign ones such as Persia, Java, Siberia, etc. are hard to procure and I cannot give you any address in those parts ...but if you were to look in Tuck's register you would very likely find people in those parts. I am in correspondence with people in Germany, Austria, Denmark, France, Australia, New Zealand and Italy. W.E.H.

Sept.9,1912. I have been transferred to a station 500 miles from Bombay and no postcards but plenty of time for my favorite sport which is shooting wild game. WEH Sept.17,1912. Where I am now stationed I am very sorry to tell you that I am in a bad place in India for purchasing postcards. I am now in the North West Frontier. Sincerely, Pte.E. Emmes, C.Co., 11st Manchester Regt. Punjab, India Oct.13,1912. I am sending you two of Tuck's...I find it impossible to find those you mention except Korea which I have sent for.

Apr.17,1913. Please exchange with the bugler. Allen W. Bugler, lst Durham Light Infantry, Nowshera, NWF, India. I only like views. Please let me know if you like this kind. July 14,1913. Please make a square hole in the envelope on the right hand top corner so the stamp can be struck on the PC and still allow the postal authorities to deface. Can you oblige me by doing so as it is a great pity to throw the fine views away after they come so many miles. A.J.M.

Oct.28,1913. Now Miss Aborn, what about a photo of yourself? I'll send you mine when I get yours. That is fair, isn't it?

Dec.11,1913.I am very sorry you had to pay 6s (shillings)for the cards that I sent you but it will not occur again.I hope you enjoyed yourself at the Exhibition.

I have received several of your PCs but I am really sorry I cannot place them in my Album as they reached here in awful condition at times which is really a waste of money, labor and postage. I shall be very glad if you will enclose in cover for the future. (July 14,1913)
