

INTRODUCTION

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

For collectors of postal markings and particularly for those whose interests gravitate toward nineteenth century United States postal history, the story of John W. Hill, creator of the Waterbury cancellations, will evoke marked interest. The products of his imaginative pocket knife earned him the accolade of "The Whittling Yankee." Today his creations rank as classics in their sphere and the **Waterburys**, as they are familiarly known to devotees of the subject, top the list of desirable fancy cancellations.

John W. Hill was born in Straitsville, Connecticut, on April 13, 1834, the son of Henry A. and Annie Hill. Some time afterward the family moved to Waterbury. It is here that we learn of John, now a young man, being apprenticed as a die sinker. Brass buttons were in great demand at the time, and John probably intended to make a career at the trade.

The outbreak of the Civil War disrupted whatever plans he may have had. In 1861 we find him listed as a corporal in Company E of the Sixth Connecticut Volunteers of Infantry. On July 30 of the following year he was given a disability discharge, but in October of the next year he re-enlisted and shortly thereafter was appointed postmaster for his regiment.

After the war Hill returned to Waterbury where he found work in the local post office. His duties as a postal clerk assigned to the sorting and cancelling of mail must have proven boring, and he probably turned to his whittling ability to relieve the tedium. John had always enjoyed whittling. A story is told about his carving an endless chain out of a piece of pine wood while on a fishing trip. Another anecdote describes him as carving a bust of President Grant on the head of a cane. Among his acquaintances he was reputed as "the man who works at the post office and is always whittling."

The plain and uninteresting cancellations used by the Waterbury post office at the time understandably proved an irresistible temptation to a man of Hill's whittling ability. An assortment of figures and designs, some quite complex, were created by him while working as a postal clerk. He continued his carving, producing additional cancels from time to time even after his promotion to the position of postmaster in 1870. Stories purporting to explain why specific cancellations were designed by Hill, or to what event they applied, vary greatly. Some of his creations certainly were purely whimsical results of his fertile imagination. Of the many devices Hill fashioned from cork the earliest known is a **Star surrounded by Five Hearts**, possibly intended for use on Valentine's Day but actually first encountered on March 17, 1865. However, Hill did carve a series of **Hearts** and **Heart-and-Arrow** cancellations, used for Valentine's Day over a number of years. A variety of **Star, Rosette** and **Geometric Designs** followed this first creation and probably account for fifty percent of the known cancellations.

The profile of a **Soldier**, the **Shields** and the **U.S.** cancellations held a patriotic connotation of his Civil War service. The **100** on Flag Day 1876 and the **76** were, in effect, centennial compositions.

Many of Hill's concoctions reflected particular events. The **Elephants** used in April 1866 were occasioned by the arrival of the circus in the spring of that year. The **Fish** design reveals that by July 15 Hill was concentrating on one of his favorite pastimes. The snow storm in 1867 undoubtedly inspired a cancellation design used on February 21 of that year.

The **Crossed Bats**, **Bases and Baseball** cancel used on July 24, 1867 was motivated by a baseball game played between the Excelsior team from Waterbury and the Naugatuck Valley Nine. Hill later recalled he had whittled the design on the morning of the game which, incidentally, was won by the Waterbury contingent by a score of 40 to 27. It is interesting to note that this cancellation was used at intervals until September of that year.

The **Mortar and Pestle** and **Skull and Crossbones** cancellations are reminders of Hill's visits to Leavenworth and Dikeman's Drug Store next to the post office. Every time a new shipment of corks arrived, Hill was allowed to look them over and select the most dense to whittle his cancelling devices.

Hill's **Duck** was used September 27, 1867 probably either before or after a hunting trip. The **Bee** cancellations have remained something of a mystery insofar as their reason for appearance is concerned; they were used in March when bees are still dormant. His **Pumpkin** design, used in June when pumpkin vines are only beginning to sprout, is similarly inexplicable. A number of his designs reveal no connection with any particular event; two of the Lady with a Bonnet, Lady with a Snood, the many Men's Profiles with Hats, Men with Pipes, the Mugs, the Stein, the Three-Button Shoe and the Congress Gaiter, the Dog's Head, the Eagles, the Tulip and other Flowers, the Clover Leaf, Apple, Pear and Padlock are all in this category.

The politically motivated designs are most interesting. The one showing the initials A.J. carved on a tombstone was used in conjunction with the end of Andrew Johnson's term as president on March 4, 1869. The **Hayes** cancellation of Saturday, February 17, 1877, was followed by **185** on Monday, February 19. While the special election commission was deciding the validity of the votes of various states, Hill showed his preference to be Rutherford B. Hayes. Inaugurated in 1877 President Hayes reappointed Hill postmaster that same year. In 1880 the **H** in a black circle appeared, suggesting yet another reference to Hayes whose term of office expired that year. On election day in November 1880 a large **G** was used indicating Hill's preference for candidate Garfield.

The various letters cut by Hill include several W designs which evidently refer to "Waterbury." The types of the A as well as Dand G remain unexplained.

A Running Chicken design was used in 1869, inspired by an advertising corner card Hill had seen; and the pesky flies of summer most likely provided the motivation for the Shoo-Fly cancel used in 1870. These devices, carved in cork, did not see extended use. Their fragility rendered them susceptible to easy damage and the results of rapid deterioration are seen in some cancellations which reveal chipped areas producing varieties, particularly in the case of the more complex designs. When the devices began to crumble, or Hill had carved a new one, the old designs were relegated to a cigar box for possible future use. This would account for the long interval between usages of some of the cancels, such as the Star and Hearts which was first used March 7, 1865, then retrieved from the cigar box and used for a period from October 18 to October 26, 1867. This also happened with the Bridgeport Fireman cancellation first used in April and May, 1866, to be used a second time more than a year later.

Hill died October 12, 1921. None of his devices were preserved for posterity as the local post office and its contents were destroyed by the great Waterbury fire of 1902.

NUMBERING SYSTEM

The system adopted for numbering the various cancellation designs illustrated in this work consists of a prefix letter, denoting the group to which the design is assigned, followed by a number.

ARRANGEMENT OF CONTENTS

The book's contents are arranged under five chapter headings. CHAPTER ONE illustrates and gives pertinent data concerning the town postmarks used during the period of the Waterbury cancels. These town postmarks are identified by the prefix letter "T".

CHAPTER TWO, by far the largest in content, illustrates and lists all known pertinent data regarding each Waterbury cancel whose authenticity is supported by genuine covers. It is to be noted that some cancels listed in this chapter may be assigned to more than one group. Thus the cancel consisting of a **Star and Hearts** appears in GROUP J **Hearts** as well as in GROUP S with **Stars**. A cross reference is employed to note the fact.

The cancels were copied with extreme care, either through tracing or by photographic process, to ensure the greatest possible accuracy. To forestall attempts at counterfeiting, however, they are not shown in actual size.

Variations in the cancels caused by breakdown of the canceller are not shown, except in the case of those that have heretofore been listed as separate varieties. These are included as minor varieties and are identified by an "a" following the classification number.

In CHAPTER THREE will be found illustrated various unauthenticated cancels together with relative data. These are identified by the prefix letter "U". Counterfeits of the Waterbury cancels together with outright fantasies are included in CHAPTER FOUR and are assigned the prefix letter "X". CHAPTER FIVE is the appendix containing collateral information.

RARITY QUOTIENT

The Waterbury cancellations are all very scarce, with only 35 copies known of the most common designs. The more creative and picturesque of them, such as animals, faces, objects, flowers, etc., command higher prices than others, although they might not be as rare as some. It is understood, of course, that cancellations on covers are far more valuable than on off-cover stamps.

Since it is impossible to provide a table of actual value, it has been decided to indicate the relative rarity of each design based upon the number of specimens known or recorded, as follows:

(RRRR)	Not more than 5 copies known.
(RRR)	Not more than 8 copies known.
(RR)	Not more than 15 copies known.
(R)	More than 15 copies known.

The present study is offered in an attempt to bring up to date all available information regarding the "WATERBURY CANCELLA-TIONS." In it are included all new discoveries known to the author, together with illustrations and related data. Whenever possible, complete covers are shown.

It is to be hoped that further information on the subject, as well as additional examples not yet recorded, may be brought to light for the increased knowledge and pleasure of collectors and postal historians.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

This work would not have been possible without the endless efforts and cooperation of Dr. Glenn E. Jackson of Watertown, Connecticut, who spent a period of nearly forty years collecting and recording the cancellations and information on covers and stamps available to him. Through his own collecting, as well as through contacts with other collectors, dealers, and other sources, he has succeeded in compiling a record of all the known cancellations together with the dates of their usage.

Recognition should also be accorded to J. P. Elton, one of the early contributors to the first Waterbury book. He put together a collection of over one hundred fifty examples of these markings. As a friend of the creator of these designs, Elton was able to assemble the stories behind many of the Waterbury cancellations.



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


As a prelude to the listing of the Waterbury cancellations, we here illustrate the various types of townmarks used during the period from 1865 to 1890.

CHAPTER ONE

TOWN POSTMARKS

In the period between 1865 and 1890, during which time the Waterbury cancellations were in use, there were ten different town postmarks and one sub-variety. These are illustrated below. The exact dates of use are not known.



- **T-1:** Used from July 1864 to 1869.
- **T-2:** The letters "CT" are far apart. This cancel was used from some time in 1869 until Dec. 31, 1869.
- **T-2A:** This is a variety of T-2, the outer circle between the "T" and the period being broken. This break is first found Dec. 31, 1869; the cancel showing it continued in use until some time in 1871.
- **T-3:** Townmark without a circle, used from some time in 1870 until some time in early 1872.
- **T-4:** The spacing between the right end of the top of the "C" and the left end of the top of the "T" is 3 mm. to 3-1/2 mm., depending on the heaviness of the strike of the canceller. Used from some time in 1872 until some time in 1877.
- **T-5:** The spacing between the right end of the top of the "C" and the left end of the top of the "T" is 1 mm. to 1-1/2 mm., depending on the heaviness of the strike of the canceller. Used from some time in 1872 until some time in 1877.
- **T-6:** The distance from the lower part of the right point of the "W" of "WATERBURY" to the left top side of the "C" of "CONN." is 5 mm. Used from some time in 1877 until (?). Very few covers with this townmark are known.
- T-7: The distance from the lower part of the right point of the "W" of "WATERBURY" to the left top side of the "C" of "CONN." is 8-1/2 mm. to 9 mm., depending on the heaviness of the strike of the canceller. Used from some time in 1874 until 1881 (?).
- **T-8:** The distance from the lower part of the right point of the "W" of "WATERBURY" to the left top side of the "C" of "CONN." is 5 mm. This cancel is similar to T-6, except that the month and date have been raised and the time is included. Used from some time in 1879 until 1885 (?).
- **T-9:** The distance from the lower part of the right point of the "W" of "WATERBURY" to the left top side of the "C" of "CONN." is 7 mm. Used from sometime in 1880 until 1885 (?).
- **T-10:** This differs from T-9 in that it includes the month, date, hour and year. Used from some time in 1885 until 1898(?).

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These cancellations are among the scarcest and least used. They are in great demand by philatelic collectors.

- A-9. Eagle. Used on 3¢ Banknote stamp, Aug. 2, 187(?). (RRRR)
- A-10. Duck on Water. Used on 3¢ 1861 stamp, Sept. 21, 1867 to Sept. 24, 1867. (RRRR)
- A-11. Running Chicken. Used on 1869 stamps, Nov. 29, 1869. A cover (see Fig. 13) with three 1¢ stamps sold for \$45,000.00 in a 1977 Robert A. Siegel sale. (RRR)
- A-12. Fish. Used on 3¢ 1861 stamp, Aug. 16, 1866 to Aug. 20, 1866. (RRRR)
- A-13. Large Bee. Used on 1¢ and 3¢ 1869 stamps, March 12, 1869(?) to March 31, 1870. (RRR)
- A-14. Small Bee. Used on 1¢ and 3¢ 1869 stamps, Feb. 2, 1870 to Mar. 18, 1870. (RRR)




Figure 5: A-5, Pig. Used on 3¢ 1861 stamp, Townmark T-1, Sept. 25, 1867.




Figure 6: A-6, Zebra. Used on 3¢ 1861 stamp, Townmark T-2, Apr. 5, 1869.




Figure 10: A-9, Eagle. Used on 3¢ Banknote stamp, together with two 3¢ Banknote stamps cancelled with D-1, Garden Paths, Townmark T-5, Aug. 2, 187(?).




Figure 29: **B-14, Arrowheads.** Used on 1¢ 1875 postcard, Townmark T-7, May 9, 1877.





Figure 32: **B-17**, **Arrowheads.** Used on 3¢ Banknote stamp, Townmark T-8, Apr. 14 (188?).






Figure 35: C-1, Crossroads. Used on 3¢ Banknote stamp, Townmark T-5, Dec. 13, 1872.








Figure 48: **D-4, Garden Paths, Type 4.** Used on 3¢ Banknote stamp, Townmark T-5, Nov. 19, 1874.




Figure 56: **D-13**, **Circle of Eight Triangles**, **Type 1**. Used on 1¢ and pair of 3¢ Banknote stamps, Townmark T-5, Mar. 18 (187?) on cover to Vienna, Austria. (Waterbury covers sent out of the country are extremely scarce.)


Figure 66: **D-23, Target of Three Rings.** Used on 3¢ Banknote stamp, Townmark T-4, Jan. 7 (187?). (This cancel was not one of Hill's hand carved cancels and was used only in his absence). 60




Figure 76: **E-6A, Bridgeport Fireman.** Used on 3¢ 1861 stamp, Townmark T-1, May 7, 1866.




Figure 96: **F-13**, **Three Leaf Shamrock**, **Type 6**. Used on 1¢ 1867 grilled stamp on piece, Townmark T-2 or T-2A.

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


Figure 102: G-2, Pumpkin. Used on 3¢ 1869 stamp, Townmark T-2, Jul. 15, 1869.






Figure 113: H-10, Oval Grid, Type 1. Used on 3¢ Banknote stamp, Townmark T-7, Apr. 20 (187?).




Figure 117: H-14, Oval Grid, Type 5. Used on 3¢ Banknote stamp, Townmark T-9, May 9, 1881.




Figure 120: H-17, Oval Grid, Type 8. Used on 3¢ Banknote stamp, Townmark T-9, Nov. 10, 1882.





Figure 125: **H-24, Pear Shaped Grill.** Used on 3¢ 1864 entire, Townmark T-1, Nov. 23 (1866?).




Figure 126: J-1, Double Heart. Used on 3¢ 1861 stamp on cover showing use of two different Waterbury cancellations together (J-1, Double Heart and S-5A, Six-Pointed Star), Townmark T-1, Feb. 21, 1868.


Figure 133: J-9, Circle of Three Hearts and Three Diamonds. Used on single and pair of 1¢ 1861 stamps, Townmark T-1, Dec. 6, 1867.




Figure 144: K-11, Negative "H" in Circle. Used on 1¢ 1875 postcard, Townmark T-8, Mar. 2, 1880.




Figure 149: K-15, Initial "W" with serifs, type 2. Used on 3¢ 1861 stamp on a Lincoln Campaign Cover, Townmark T-1, Feb. 17, 1866.


Figure 151: K-17, Initial "W" with serifs, Type 4. Used on 3¢ 1861 stamp, Townmark T-1, Jul. 3, 1866.






Figure 154: L-1, Elm Leaf. Used on 3¢ 1861 stamp, Townmark T-1, Aug. 10, 1866.




Figure 177: L-31, Stylized Leaf, Nine Segments. Used on 3¢ 1874 Plimpton entire, Townmark T-7, Aug. 8, 1878.




Figure 182: L-36, Stylized Leaf, Ten Segments, Type 5. Used on 3¢ Banknote stamp, Townmark T-4, Sept. 2 (187?). This corner card was the inspiration for Hill's Running Chicken design (cancel #A-11).




Figure 184: L-38, Stylized Leaf, Ten Segments, Type 7. Used on 1¢ 1875 Postcard, Townmark T-8, Jun. 28, 1880.





Figure 195: **L-51, Stylized Leaf, Fifteen Segments.** Used on 3¢ Banknote stamp, Townmark T-5, June 30 (187?).




Figure 196: M-1, "HAYES". Used on 1¢ 1875 postcard, Townmark T-7, Feb. 17, 1877.




Figure 197: **M-2**, "**SHOO FLY**". Used on 1¢ grilled Banknote stamp, Townmark T-2A. Jun. 23, 1870(?).





Figure 199: **M-3**, "U S". Used on 3¢ 1861 stamp, Townmark T-1, Mar. 16, 1866.




Figure 200: N-2, Negative "5" in Circle. Used on 1¢ 1875 postcard, Townmark T-7, Apr. 29, 1880.




Figure 202: N-5, "100". Used on 3¢ Banknote stamp, Townmark T-4, Jun. 12, 1876.





Figure 204: N-6, "185". Used on 3¢ Banknote stamp, Townmark T-7, Feb. 19, 1877.




Figure 210: O-5, Mortar and Pestle, Type 1. Used on 3¢ 1861 stamp, Townmark T-1, May 14, 1867.




Figure 211: **O-6, Mortar and Pestle, Type 2.** Used on 1¢ grilled 1867 stamp, Townmark T-2, Jun. 19, 1869.




Figure 216: **O-10, Padlock.** Used on 3¢ 1861 stamp, Townmark T-1, Dec. 27, 1867.




Figure 217: **O-11, Pitcher.** Used on 3¢ 1861 stamp, Townmark T-1, Sept. 2, 1867.





Figure 218: **O-12, Buttonless Shoe (Congress Gaiter).** Used on 1¢ 1869 stamp, Townmark T-2A, Mar. 22, 1870(?).








Figure 223: **P-4, Rosette, Six Segments, Type 4.** Used on 3¢ 1869 stamp, Townmark T-2A, May 7, 1870(?).




Figure 229: **P-10, Rosette, Eight Segments, Type 1.** Used on 1¢ Banknote stamp, Townmark T-5, Mar. 25, 1873.




Figure 240: P-21, Rosette, Eight Segments, Type 12. Used on 1¢ 1875 postcard, Townmark T-8, Oct. 10, 1879.


Figure 249: **P-29, Rosette, Eleven Segments.** Used on 3¢ 1861 stamp, Townmark T-1, Jan. 30, 1868.






Figure 252: Q-2, Shield, Five Bars, Pointed Closed Top, Type 2. Used on 3¢ 1861 stamp, Townmark T-1, Sept. 11, 1866.




Figure 258: Q-7, Shield, Five Bars, Solid Top, Type 2. Used on 1¢ 1875 postcard, Townmark T-7, Mar. 19, 1878.




Figure 276: **S-8**, Negative Five-Point Star in Black Circle. Used on 3¢ Banknote stamp, townmark T-3, May 17, 1872.

CHAPTER THREE

UNAUTHENTICATED CANCELS

A number of cancellations have been identified heretofore as Waterbury cancels and attributed to John W. Hill. These have never been substantiated through genuine covers. Some of these designs are poor drawings or tracings of genuine cancels.

For the purpose of the record, such unauthenticated cancels that have come to the attention of the author are included and illustrated herein as numbers U-1 to U-22.

- U-1. Horse, known on a 3¢ 1861 stamp; according to Elton, the owner of some covers claimed to have removed this item from a genuine cover.
- U-2. Maltese Cross, no information.
- U-3. Solid Maltese Cross, no information.
- **U-4.** Man with Hat. This is a poor drawing of E-6A from a poor strike of the **Bridgeport Fireman**.
- **U-5.** Man with Flat Hat, partial strike on 3¢ 1861 stamp; no other information available.
- **U-6.** Two Men with Cane, on a 3¢ 1861 stamp; no other information available.
- **U-7.** Three Leaf Shamrock, could be a poor drawing of F-8; no other information available.
- U-8. Three Leaf Shamrock, no information.
- **U-9.** Three Leaf Shamrock, could be a poor drawing of F-13; no other information available.
- **U-10. Double Heart,** could be a poor drawing of J-1; no other information available.

CHAPTER FOUR

COUNTERFEITS AND FANTASIES

Commencing with the early years of stamp collecting in the 1850's, followed by the transition to the practice of collecting the entire folded letter sheet or envelope, the era of postal history interest gradually evolved into its present broad span. Specialization was not slow to follow, and the desire to penetrate into every facet of philatelic study carried into our present period.

The urge to secure specimens of cancels and postal markings, particularly examples on cover, has substantially affected the market for available material. It has also induced unscrupulous dealers and swindlers, sensing the possibility of quick profit, to produce varieties and even fantasies of these cancels and covers for the purpose of defrauding the collector.

The reference material we have presented here graphically illustrates the fact that the Waterburys, like so many other collectible objects, proved too promising an area for the counterfeiters to ignore.

Many of the cancels we have illustrated are counterfeit examples of existing designs. Others are outright fantasies; and some are faked covers, produced by adding a stamp or marking, in an attempt to make the cover appear legitimate.

Because of the ever increasing value accorded genuine Waterburys, we recommend that specimens be submitted for expert examination by competent individuals whose experience and knowledge of the Waterburys are recognized.




Figure 283: **X-5**, **Duck**. Used on 3¢ 1861 stamp, counterfeit cancel, incorrect Townmark applied, should be T-1.




Figure 286: X-11, Bee. Used on 3¢ 1869 stamp, both cancel and townmark are counterfeit.




Figure 290: X-16, Man With Derby. Used on 3¢ Banknote stamp, both cancel and Townmark T-2 are counterfeit.




Figure 293: **X-22, Flower and Leaves on a Stem.** Used on 3¢ 1861 stamp, counterfeit cancel, Townmark T-2A is genuine.




Figure 294: **X-22, Flower and Leaves on a Stem.** Used on 50¢ Conveyance Revenue stamp (Scott #R54c), counterfeit cancel.




Figure 298: X-29, "SHOO FLY." Used on 3¢ 1861 stamp, both cancel and townmark are counterfeit.




Figure 299: X-29, "SHOO FLY." Used on 3¢ Banknote stamp, both cancel and townmark are counterfeit.

CHAPTER FIVE

APPENDIX

One of the first philatelists to discover and show an interest in the Waterbury cancellations was Ray Sanborne of New Haven, Connecticut. Among the early items, covers and stamps bearing these attractive designs acquired by Sanborne in June, 1918 and January, 1919 from Ann Anderson, were pieces from the Anderson correspondence.

In order to obtain background information about the person who had created these designs, Sanborne wrote a letter on August 6, 1918 to the Postmaster at Waterbury (Figure 302); the Postmaster forwarded the letter to Hill (Figure 302). In response to this, Hill contacted Sanborne and furnished him with information about the cancellations.

The first major sale of Waterbury cancellations contained material acquired by Sanborne. This sale was held by J. M. Bartels of New York City on February 15, 1919. It was reported in the May 24, 1919 issue of Mekeel's Weekly Stamp News.



These letters, all mailed at Waterbury, Conn. between 1866 and about 1882, bear a striking testimony of the ingenuity of the town postmaster who adopted a mul-titude of most unusual designs for cancelling mail. Many of them were un-doubtedly in use only a few days, for instance on valentines or for fairs, con-ventions and when the circus came to town. About 40 of these designs have been written up from this lot and tracings made by Mr. Ault for the February number of the American Philatelist. Written for MEKEEL'S WEEKLY. WATERBURY CANCELLATIONS.

Ingenuity in the mind of a postal clerk or postmaster would be frowned upon nowadays by the authorities unless the ingenious inventions were first submitted to them for their approval. This was not the case back in the "sixties" if we take for example the designs for cancellations devised in the brain and ably executed by an artistic postmaster or postal clerk of the postoffice at Waterbury, Connecticut, during that period.

The post office official would not find time nowadays to while away the hours between mails by whittling fanciful designs on the end of a cork or a block of wood. Nor would the higher up officials permit the vagaries of such a whittler to continue should he attempt a continuous use of his artistic productions.

Perhaps the artist, or artists, who also occupied an easy position at the Waterbury Postoffice, little thought of the demand his works of art would have sixty years after he whiled away his time by commemorating the events of his time in cutting cork obliterators for defacing the postage stamps on mail matter passing through his hands.

Can it be said, stamp collecting is a mingling of the curious with the artistic? The art of enhancing a stamp collection with curious bits of postal history appears to be on the increase. In the early days of philately the stamp wasn't collected for its odd or fanciful cancellation. Now, we all know the futility of attempting to form a complete or anywhere near complete collection of postage stamps. Thousands of our philatelists are using their efforts along the line of collecting stamps as curios some stamps are becoming antiques. This is the outcome of most all kinds of collecting. One's field is limited. and

one is guided solely by his pocketbook cost him little or nothing. When many begin the hunt, the value of the soughtafter is enhanced.

At a recent auction sale held by the J. M. Bartels Co. in New York City, thirtytwo lots of covers bearing stamps issued from 1861 to late in the seventies and cancelled at the Waterbury, Ct., post office, were offered to collectors. The cancellations were of great variety and displayed the talents of the postal official mentioned above. It is possible the artist kept a record of the use of the varying marks, and a complete list would be of considerable interest. However, awaiting the publication of such a list, if it exists, the philatelist can check up dates from available information on the subject.

Mr. William E. Ault, of St. Louis, recently wrote of these odd cancellations (American Philatelist, Feb., 1919) which had been submitted to him by Mr. M. Ray Sanborn, of West Haven, Ct. The publicity thus extended to them has had the effect of stimulating the collecting of cancellations. The old time collectors of cancellations, however, always on the watch out for them, and knowing their value, did not let the Waterbury marks get away from them. Spirited bidding at the auction sale resulted in several of the more artistic cancellations bringing very good prices.

The illustrations are not tracings of the actual cancellations, but poor freehand drawings, the marks losing much of their artistic merit in the reproduction.

Star cancellations are fairly common and therefore the prices for these were not as strong as for more carefully executed artistry.

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
