






MINIATURE CHRISTMAS GREETINGS

Above is a miniature 1910 issue by the John Winsch PC Co.Penciled on the reverse is "From Papa,Dec. 25 1913". Popularity of the company's PCs saw designs continue in stores for many years. The remainder of the miniatures on this page are designs by Ainä Stenberg.Whereas the Winsch PC has mute tans and greens, the Stenberg cards are pastel yellows, oranges and rusts, a departure from typical American Christmas colors. Stenberg was born in 1885. Her work reflects the beautiful art nouveau influence of her time.

Miniature greeting cards are not uncommon. Finding cancelled ones is a challenge. One of the pair(left) was cancelled in Phila.PA, Dec. 23, 1923. It was mailed to nearby Limerick. An unidentified publisher.

PATD AD

The little skiers(lower left)send greetings for a GOOD CHRISTMAS AND A GOOD NEW YEAR (note large "1"). The Swedish stamp is cancelled 1950 but neither the mailing town nor destination are legible.

The final card is a posed colored photo. The huge "1"again hints at the message, HEARTY NEW YEAR GREET-ING. The stamp in cancelled Dec.8, 1912 from Kosta, a village in southern Sweden. Olga, the receiver, lived in Jamestown, New York, North America.

Sweden published the lion's share of tiny holiday and birthday greeting PCs. Why? THEORY: Cold weather natives find speaking with fewer words conserves the breath when outdoors and this conciseness extends to their writing. (Just a theory.)

The Nuremberg factory of E. Nister printed some of the finest quality postcards you'll ever collect. Earliest issues have undivided backs. Nister's London branch opened in 1888. Many of these cards survive to be treasured by discriminating collectors. Views exist, but it's their holidays and children that we Americans cherish. Three of their Christmas postcards are shown here.

The color lithography is unsurpassed. If there's a downside to collecting Nisters, it's that you'll need a magnifier to keep a record of their individual numbers on the backs. But a simple 5x magnifier is a small price to pay for these beauties.

#2410. Father Christmas is spied upon as he brings toys into the parlor of a Victorian home. Unsigned.
