BIRTH ANNOUNCEMENT – A Franz Huld Installment Image With All Parts on One Postcard!


When I came across the Stork Birth Announcement (top right) by Franz Huld I was pleased to consider it was an adjunct to my Installment collection, consisting, to a large part, of Sets by Franz Huld, noted for his Novelty PCs among other popular post card sets.

It was a typical birth PC with a blank to fill in the new baby's name and its weight and written in a humorous vein, "I hope it will bring me fame."


But on closer examination the published date, 1906, didn't ring true. The identical

image, Stork with Babe in its Bill on my installment is clearly labeled "Huld's Puzzle Series No. 8-a" with a copyright of 1907. So, it would appear Huld got his idea for the Installment Set from the Birth Announcements? Or didn't he simply hold this stork idea until he had concluded his installment subjects?

NOTE: The recipient of Installments always received the most perplexing part of the animal first, adding to the adventure of Postcard Collection!







THREE ANTROPOMORPHICS From Ottmar Zieher

Ottmar Zieher was a prominent postcard publisher from Munich, Germany. Much of his superb work is highly prized by today's collectors. These examples of odd-looking folks — anthropomorphics, conjure up thoughts of food and drink, exactly what the advertiser (on the rev.) intended. The Bratwurstglöckerl Restaurant at #1 Main St. in Vienna, catered to folks looking for Zufriedenheit, a happy time where they ate, drank, sang and danced.
