EASTER RABBITS

What must little Mabel Lynch be thinking as she looks over the huge array of Easter bunnies and eggs that are ALL hers? Mabel grew up in a modest row home in Cabbage Hill. When I met her in 1991, she was retired from library work but was volunteering to show visitors around Lancaster Center City, concentrating on its history.



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Mabel's dad was a professional photographer as well as an amateur historian, and we postcard collectors have him to thank for taking photos and publishing them as six postcards of the city's only fire houses. He issued the PCs when the horse-drawn wagons were converting to gasoline fire trucks.

When Jim Ward bought the unsold stock of PCs, Mabel showed Jim her personal collection of cards, made from photos taken by her dad. Knowing Jim's admiration for the RP cards, she left Jim speechless when a duplicate of the Easter array came through the mail two days later – with no damage.

On the top left, a chromolithograph Easter card also survived the mails. It came from Leipzig, Germany, and arrived in NYC on April 14, 1898.

Our two remaining cards are by Whitney from the 1930s.

Then, there is our monthly hand-made postcard. It features the Toonerville Trolley and the Skipper who evidently could use a pair of specs.
