





Strongman Postcards

In the days before Professional Wresting was on TV on a regular basis. There were 'Strong Men' who did various shows to exhibit their strength. Two such performers were Alexander Zass, known as 'Samson' and J.C. Tolson, known as 'Apollon'. They are pictured in this article on real photo postcards used to advertise their shows.

Zass was originally from Poland and from the 1920's lived in Britian. He was known for lifting a 500 pound girder with his teeth, carried a small horse, caught a woman fired from a cannon and allowed professional boxers to hit him in the stomach. His greatest talents were in bending steel bars and breaking chains which were the center piece of his music hall exhibitions. He also developed his own methods of body building and sold mail order courses in them.

J.C. Tolson was from England and was discovered in 1925 at one of Alexander Zass's strength competitions. He was so good at this he began following Zass's show and winning the competition each time he attended until they dropped it from the show.

He started his own show and did various feats of strength. He would start with breaking a steel chain with his fingers, lifting a 100 lbs with his little finger and tearing playing card packs into quarters. His climax was driving six inch nails into a plank of wood with his bare hands and then pulling one back out in one straight pull with his teeth. He was also known for supporting twenty men on his chest with a bridge. He also developed a mail order body building course to sell his methods.



Teachers' Institute

County Teachers' Institute was an annual event beginning in 1853. The weeklong event was held in November, usually in the city. In the early days it was a potent influence in the life of rural teachers, giving them nearly their only contact with the 'outside world' during the school year. In 1932 Institute was replaced by a series of Saturday conferences.

Postcards reveal the life of local teachers as they planned for and attended Institute in those days.



Y.M.C.A. Building, Lancaster, Pa. On Nov. 15, 1905 a message along the right margin told Luther Weiler in Churchtown "Our Institute is held here."

Cards to Brother and Sister.

Two more 1905 cards were sent from Chester T. to Master J. S. Terrill and his sister Mary in Peters Creek Both refer to attending Institute. "I see Miss Margaret often" is included on one.

A Rendevous

Samuel Shank, wrote in 1906 to Miss Daisy Wolf in Hopeland, "Well I suppose I will be in Lancaster on Wed. Will be at Institute in the afternoon so look for me and I will look for you."

To the Point

Alice Wanner, Cambridge (Salisbury Twp.), got the briefest message, "Institute fine" from M. E. R. at 506 W. Chestnut St. in November 1906.

Among Other Things...

Barbara Kreider in 1913 asked Wm. Oberholtzer in Manheim, "Will you not be one of the class of boys which can be formed next Sunday? May I look for you at Institute?" (Nov. 13, 1906.)



Ephrata Venue

On this early view of General Hospital, Mary wrote to Eva Royer in 1910, "I would like to see you at Farmers Institute at Ephrata on Wed. eve. You should try and help to swell the crowd. Ha. Ha. Your cousin Mary."

Sister Homecoming

In 1912, Olive wrote to Viola Beers in McVeytown, "My two dear sisters will be home this week on account of Institute."

Room Rented

Lillian Hummer in Manheim heard from Lydia L. in 1914, "Mrs. Eby will give us a room during Institute week. Had a card to that effect this evening."

Fine Grub

To Mrs. Ella Simpson in Churchtown, R.E.S. sent this 1917 message, "Dear Ella, OK, but cold which is worse. Fine grub and good Institute."
