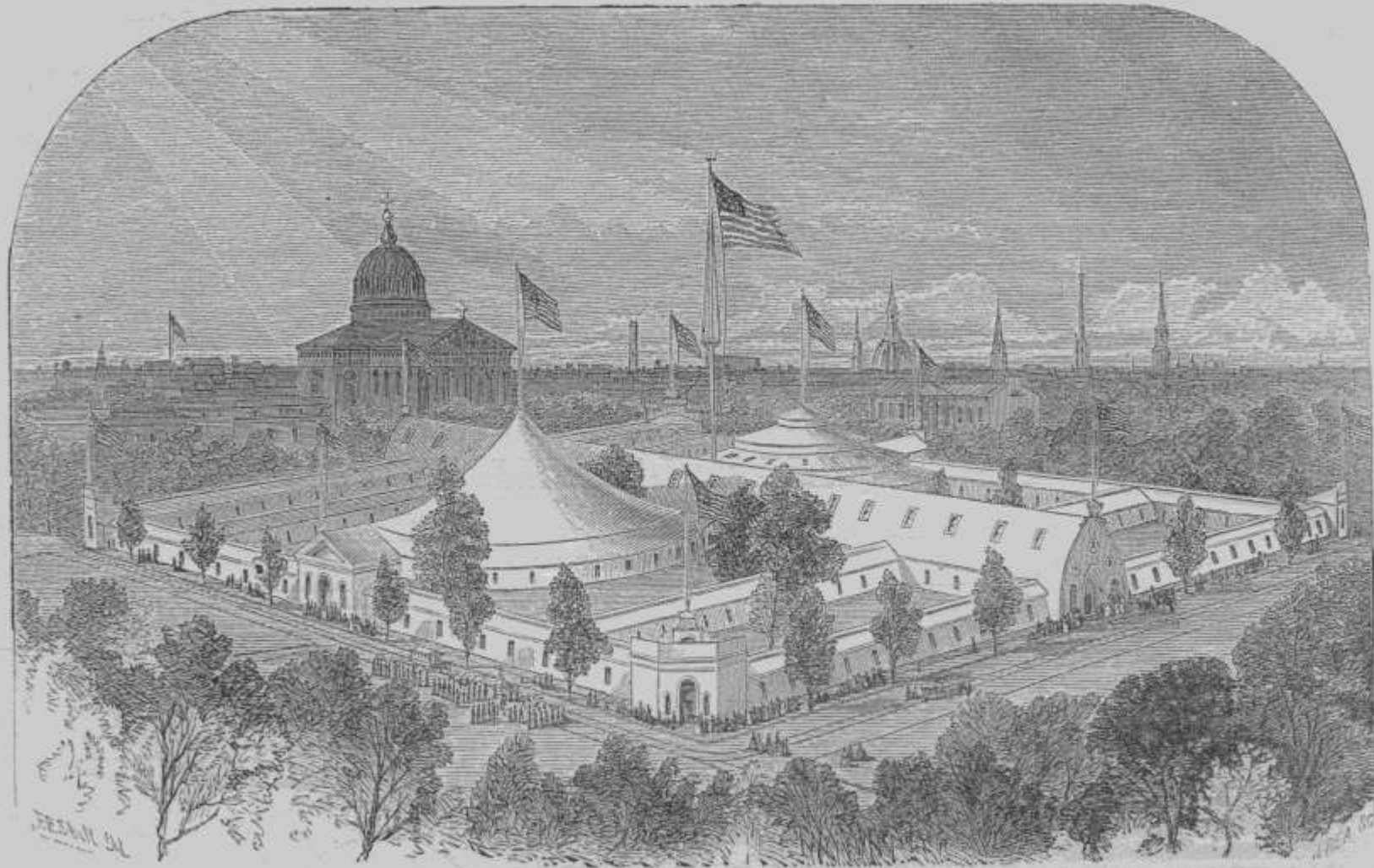

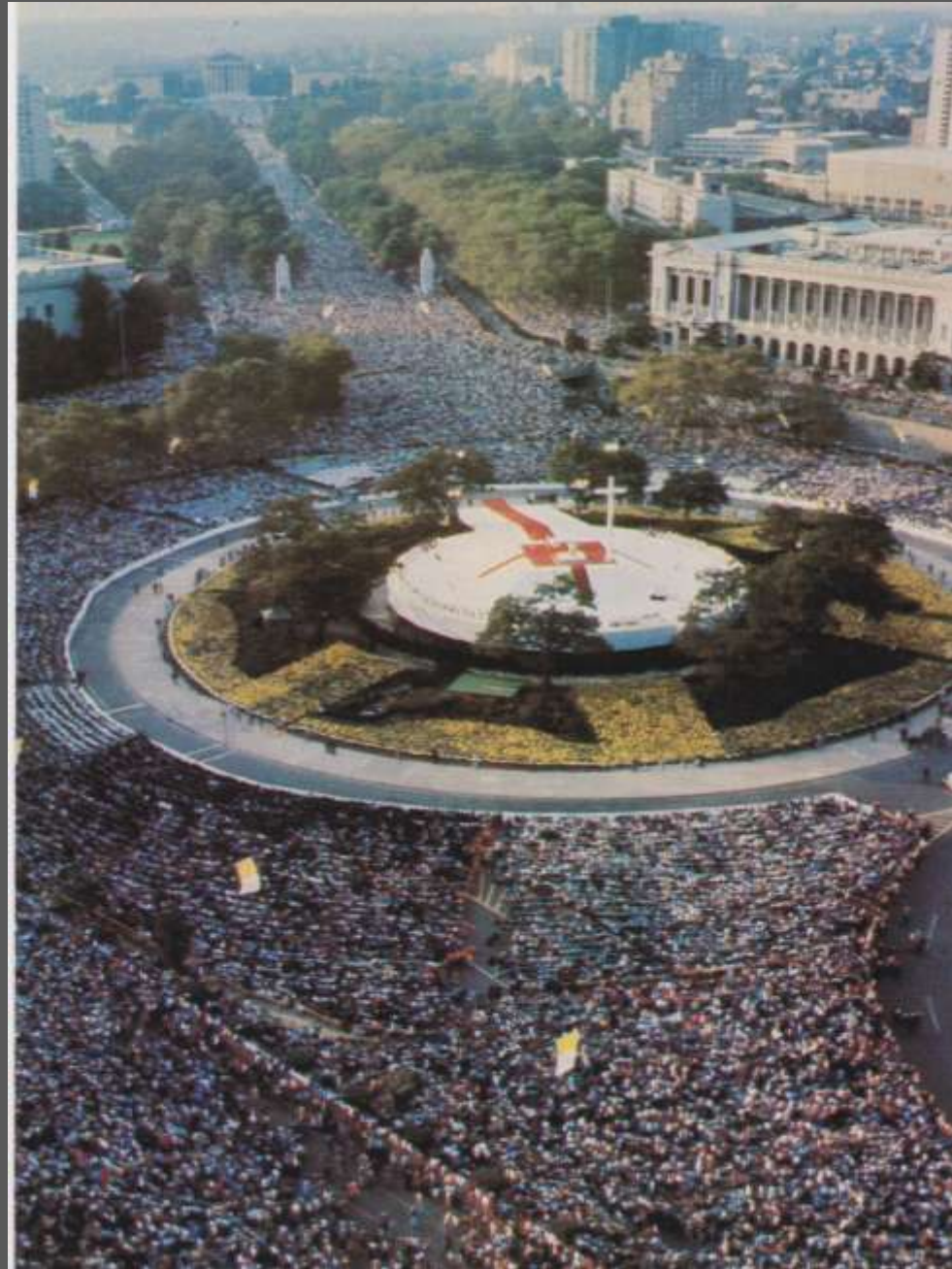

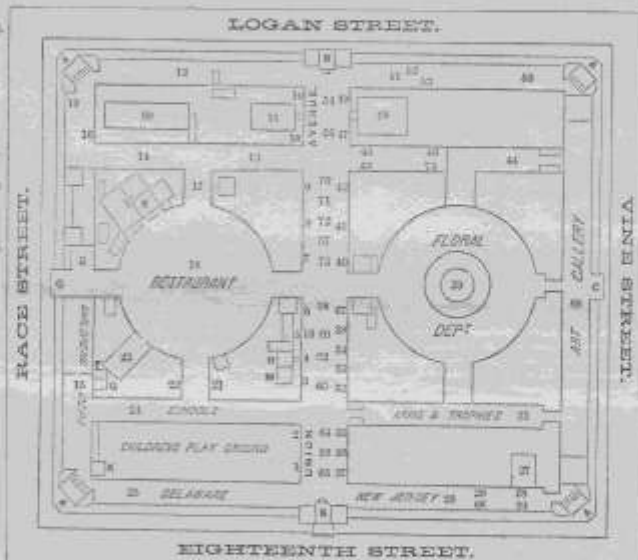


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GROUND PLAN

LOGAN SQUARE, PHILADELPHIA, 1864.

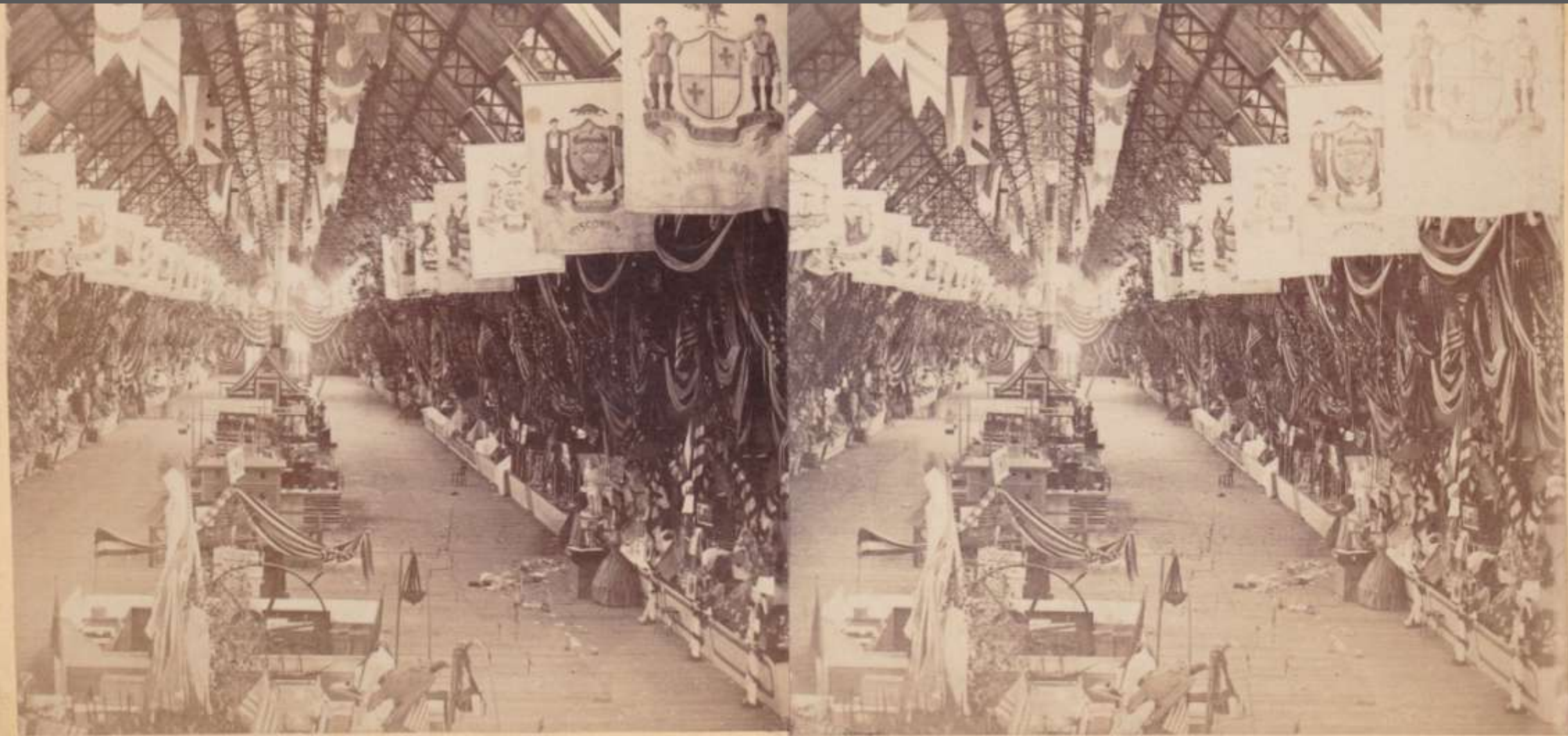

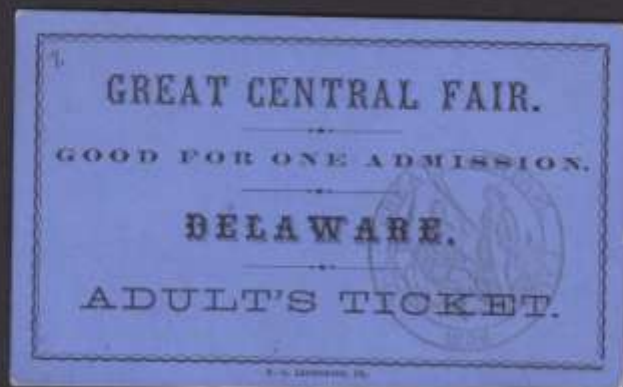
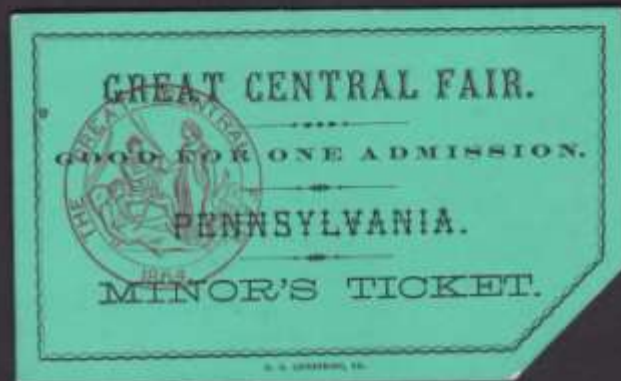

RULES
FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF
THE GREAT CENTRAL FAIR.
ESTABLISHED BY THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

I.
The day of opening will be early in June, whereas the date will be given.

II.
All articles sent to the Fair will be retained and sold for the benefit of the Executive Committee, except articles of jewelry or art, which may be retained with special permission either for exhibition only or for sale either wholly or partially for the benefit of the Executive Committee. All articles for exhibition or sale will be at the risk of the depositor.

III.
Tables, counters or booths for display and sale may be obtained by each Standing Committee as their dues, returns to the applications as to site, shape and position of the Committee on General Arrangements, such tables, etc., must be placed in charge of persons nominated by the chairman of the several Standing Committees to whom the articles that have been exhibited, and transmitted to be subject to the action of the Executive Committee for substitution or otherwise, and the persons so appointed to be subject to the directions of the Executive Committee as to the location of their sites, and as to their continuance or alterations.

IV.
In all cases where tables, etc., are so established, there shall be appointed, in each instance with the applicant, a treasurer or cash clerk for each table, whose duty it shall be to keep an account of all sales, take charge of the money received, and pay over the same to the cashier of the establishment, or to the cashier with the amount appointed by the Committee as Finance officers as shall be required.

V.
All articles exposed to sale shall have the price affixed, which shall in no case exceed their ordinary retail value.

VI.
A bank shall be established in the Fair buildings, and controlled by the Committee on Finance, and the Cashier appointed by said Committee shall deposit the moneys received daily in a city bank, to the credit of the Treasurer of the Fair.

VII.
All stands for refreshments within the enclosure of the Fair square, except that for the sale of small liquors and the stand for confectionery, shall be supplied by and be under the control of the Committee on the Restaurant.

VIII.
The Executive Committee shall be in permanent session during business hours each day of the Fair, and shall make necessary orders to settle and adjust matters, directly all matters connected with the Fair, and with all committees and persons engaged in or visiting the buildings and grounds. The members of said Committee, who may be allowed shall be a caution for the transaction of business.

IX.
The following are the rules for the price of admission:

1. Tickets for the general admission and "private view" shall be issued, not exceeding ten thousand in number, price \$1 each.

2. Season tickets shall be issued, admitting to all parts of the Fair excepting exhibitions for children, price \$1. Such tickets not to be transferable, and not to extend to the opening extension on the first day.

3. Committee's season tickets shall be issued upon the requisition of the respective chairmen, to all members of the committee who have been acting during price \$1. Furthermore, those season tickets shall not be issued to the individual members of the Executive Committee.

4. Single admission tickets, which do not admit to these exhibitions for which a separate charge is made, shall be issued, price fifty cents.

5. Free transferable tickets, which shall not admit to those exhibitions for which a separate charge is made, shall be issued for the use of the employees of the respective county towns. As a general rule, but except of such tickets shall be issued to each chairman, but the chairman of the Executive Committee is authorized to increase the number according to his discretion.

6. All the counties shall be invited to either at once provide specially for them, and to wear appropriate badges.

7. No tickets for single admissions shall be sold to persons residing in Philadelphia, but entrance to the Fair shall be had through a registering bureau, on payment of fifty cents each.

8. Tickets for single admissions shall be issued, for sale in every county of Philadelphia, and such tickets shall have upon their face a designation of the date in which the same are purchased.

9. All tickets for the States of New Jersey and Delaware will be furnished by the Secretary, at his option, upon application from the governors or Executive Committees of such States.

10. Season tickets shall be issued and placed on sale in conformity with the previous action of the Executive Committee.

11. The tickets shall be made double, so that child may have a separate register from adults, and yet may not be separated from their associates on entering.

12. Each ticket shall be attended by a keeper, who shall be in charge, but answer, with the same, and who shall be in duty for a period of six hours. It shall be the duty, immediately upon being received, to settle his account with a cashier, who shall sign the statement on a book and give the keeper a receipt thereon after settlement. The keeper must likewise make full settlements with the General Cashier of Treasury.

13. Only the exact admission money shall be received at the ticket, but a stamp whose design may be seen shall be provided and so placed as to be conspicuous before reaching the ticket.

14. Season tickets shall admit at a separate ticket, which shall be so made as to be not portable, and not being separated from such holder. If such person has a child, here the keeper is to deposit a card with the admission money in the box.

15. Persons entering the special exhibitions must also purchase a registering ticket.

Furthermore, on motion, it was resolved, That the several Committees be requested to adopt such medals as to them by the members be well designed, them respectively.

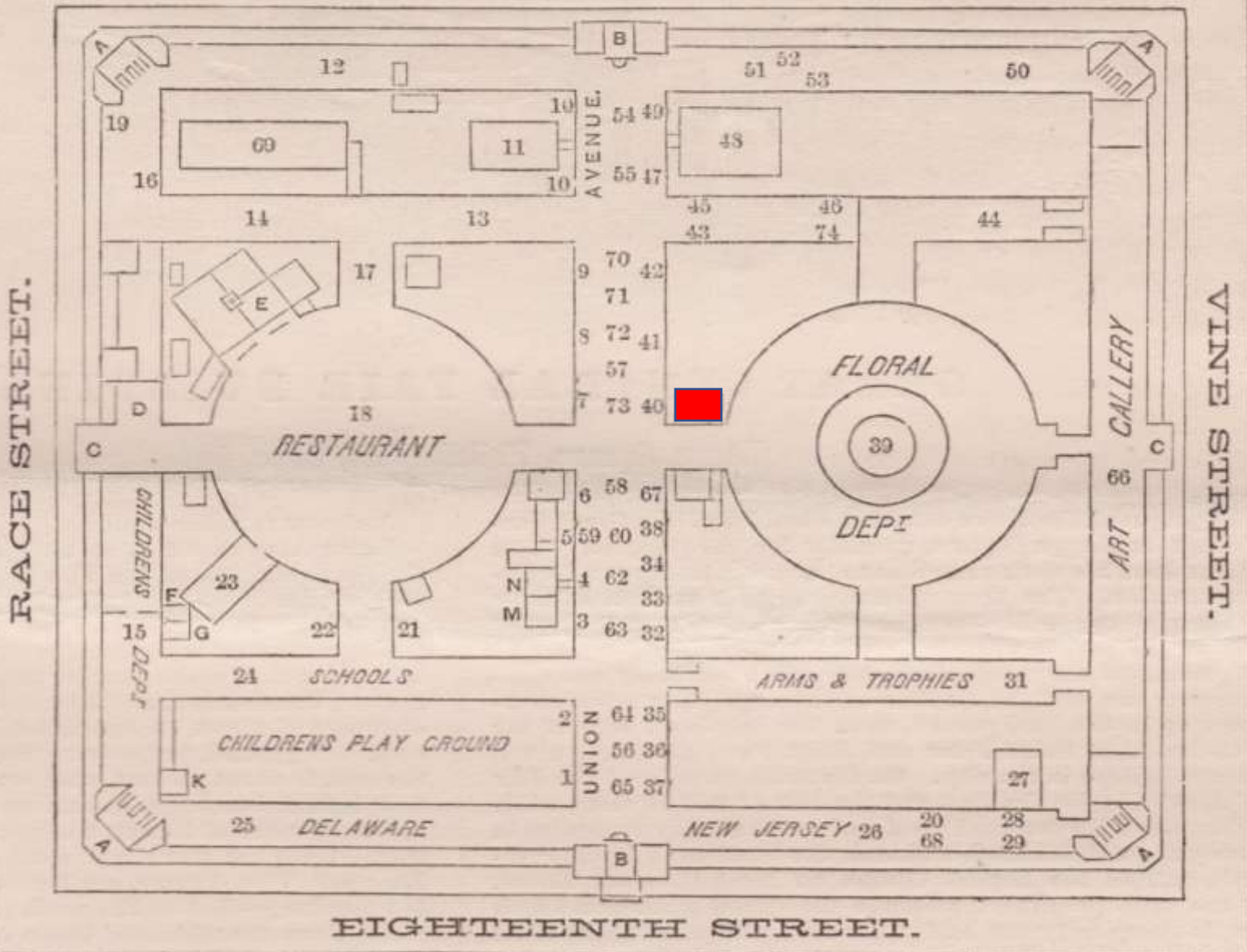

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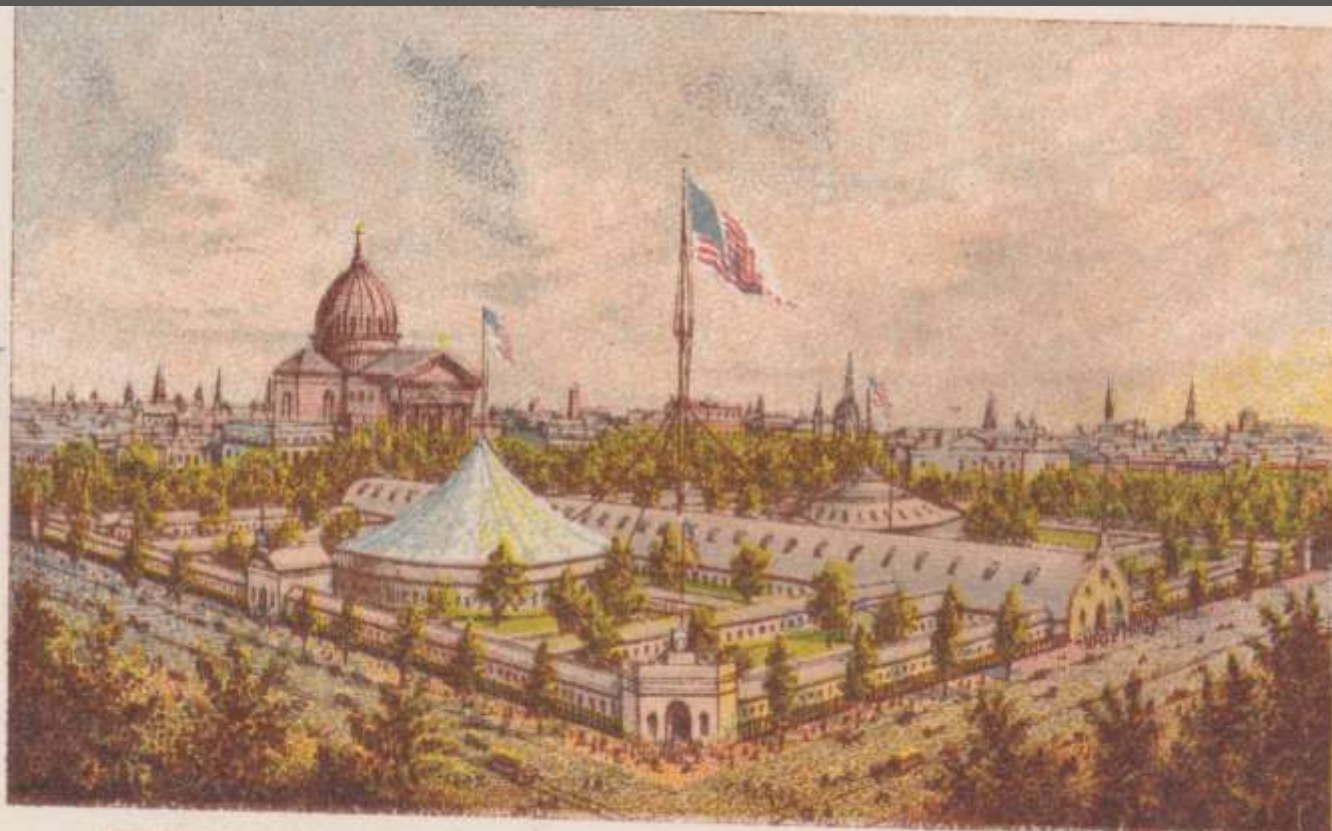
