
Last Monday in May

We're worthy of their sacrifice if we pause each day not just on the last Monday in May.


TELE DAY – MAY 17 By Jim Ward

It's actually World Telecommunication and Information Day but we're going to settle for TELEPHONES on POSTCARDS. The first, slightly larger than normal PC is post-marked from Olivia, MN on December 22,1911 and is a Christmas an New Years greeting to Miss Lucia McLarner in Chippewa Falls, WI. "The reverse is me at the telephone office. It's taken without my glasses so I don't look just right. And, Rose Kral." What a dandy PC in anybody's collection!





Many deserve some credit for the telephone: Manzetti 1844, Bourseutl 1854, Reis 1861, LaFeuille 1865, Meucci 1871, Bell 1875, Gray 1876 and Bell with more patents becomes the man who Americans associate with the invention.









We've grown through hand-cranked wooden wall phones, whistling for the operator, "candlestick" phones in the 1890s, cradle designs, rotary dials in the 1930s, touchtones, digitals and smart phones.

You'll find phone PCs lean towards being humorous, especially when the early callers were so enamored with the new gadgets that they were convinced IT could see what they saw; felt what they felt.





WORLD BEE DAY By Jim Ward

On Slovenia's initiative, the UN has proclaimed May 20 as WORLD BEE DAY. Good for them and good for us. It's about time we give more attention to bees.


Our first offer is a beautiful French Postcard honoring those industrious insects; even the stamp is an apiary. There are at least two PCs showing Lancaster County apiaries. We'll show them next year.





Seeing a neat in a tree (next card) doesn't guarantee you're looking at a wild bee colony. It might also be hornets. So our dauntless searcher looked extra hard and found PCs with real live bee hives.







Seven biological families contain 16,000 species of bees including honey bees, bumblebees and stingless bees that live in colonies; and solitary bees: mason bees, carpenter bees, leafcutter bees and sweat bees. One or the other is found on every continent except Antarctica.

Karl von Frisch discovered that the "waggle dance" of honey bees in 1953, not so long ago. It's a proven fact: they communicate where nectar is to be found. Protect honey bees. Plant bee balm flowers. And don't confuse hornet nests with bee nests, just as you shouldn't confuse chimeras with gargoyles, but that's another story.
