Following WW II, Polish volunteers who had stood next to allied troops in major engagements were stationed in Italy as occupation forces. Refusing to cooperate with communism in their native Poland, many thousands served as stabilizing units in Italy. Once offered resettlement lands on the Italian peninsula, the offer was withdrawn. But while they were there in 1946-7, they used the special stamps pictured in this article to frank homeward going mail.

Unfortunately, these stamps do not appear in Scott's catalogs and many consider them "cindarellas" or poster stamps. (This makes no sense to your editor, since they were postally used.) Dr. Weaver will tell the story of these fascinating stamps at our July 5th meeting. What had the Poles done to win respect during the war? First, Patton reviewed them and declared them to have the sharpest appearance of any of the troops he saw during the war. They particularly fought well at Monte Cassino, Ancona, and Bologna.

By wars end, they totaled 55,780 men, about 1,500 women and one bear! They lost 2,301 killed, 535 missing and 8,540 wounded.

July Ukraine stamp design revealed

Ukrposhta has revealed their newest stamp design for the "Good evening, we are from Ukraine!" competition. The winning submission is the Ukrainian tractor pulling an abandoned Russian tank entry. The image of a tractor pulling a tank has become one of the iconic symbols of the war.



Over 834,000 votes were cast by Ukrainians. with 3400,000 voting for the tractor. Release date has not been announced, but expect it sometime in July, along with details about the designer. 5 million stamps will be released.

Stamps showing support for Ukraine



Since the war in Ukraine began in February a growing number of post offices around the world have issued special stamps to lend support and, in most cases, raise funds for organisations helping with the country's humanitarian crisis. See the full list of stamps for Ukraine in our stamp guide.

The conflict in Ukraine has affected millions of people, and the response to the humanitarian crisis has prompted a response from around the world, including from post offices and stamp collecting communities. Nations to issue stamps include:

Latvia: 'We Are with You!'

Latvia issued a block of three stamps, and 'a special explanatory coupon', in response to the Russian invasion of Ukraine, with half of the proceeds from sales going to the charity fund Ziedot.lv programme in support of Ukraine.

The stamp block features the national flags of Ukraine and Latvia, Ukraine's Independence Monument in Kiev and Latvia's Freedom Monument in Riga as well as inscriptions in Ukrainian and Latvian saying 'We Are with You!' and 'Glory to Ukraine!'



'Glory to Ukraine!' stamp from Estonia

Estonia's simple 'Glory to Ukraine!' stamp design shows a dove against a background of the Ukraine flag; a postcard with a similar design will be given for free with all purchases of the stamp.



Poland's 'We Are with You!' stamp

Poland's 'We Are with You!' stamp shows a handshake with the hands painted in the national colours of the two countries.



Canada's 'Help for Ukraine' stamp

Canada Post has revealed the design of a fundraising stamp, set to be issued on 7 July, marking the first time Canada has issued a stamp in support of a country in need of humanitarian assistance. Funds raised through the purchase of this stamp will be distributed through the Canada-Ukraine Foundation (CUF), which is currently delivering aid wherever it is needed, from heavily shelled areas in Ukraine's north and east, to the displaced Ukrainians to the west and in neighbouring countries. A donation of \$1 from each booklet of ten stamps (and ten cents from each official First Day Cover) will provide much-needed financial assistance to those affected by the war. The Canadian stamp shows a sunflower, the national flower of Ukraine and now a widely recognised symbol of peace and unity. Canada Post originally issued a stamp with this colourful image in 2011, with the 2022 version featuring the text 'Help for Ukraine' title.



Luxembourg charity stamp

POST Luxembourg have also released a charity stamp, to help Ukrainian refugees. All proceeds from the sale of these stamps will be donated to the organisation ASBL LUkraine to support their actions for refugees from Ukraine. The stamp, available in national and international denominations, in sheets of eight, features the colours of the Ukrainian flag with a dove of peace integrated into the design.



Lithuania: defenders of freedom in Ukraine

Lithuanian Post has also issued a single stamp for 'defenders of freedom in Ukraine'. The simple image on the stamp again features the blue and yellow of the Ukrainian flag, and shows two figure hugging. The €2 stamp is a semi-postal, with half of the stamp cost covering the cost of postage and the remaining €1 being donated to the organisation Mėlyna ir Geltona (Blue / Yellow), a 'non-government organisation' that 'provides Ukrainian soldiers and volunteers with non-lethal supplies to help them battle Russian aggression.'



Croatia: For Peace in Ukraine

The stamp 'For Peace in Ukraine', issued by the Croatian Post features a simple design showing a rapeseed field below blue sky. The stamp is intended as 'an additional symbol of friendship between the Republic of Croatia and Ukraine, as well as strong mutual support for comprehensive efforts to bring peace to Ukraine, the return of its displaced and refugee citizens, and the normalization of life on the Ukrainian territory.'



Austria's semi-postal stamp

The semi-postal stamp issued by Österreichische Post is a semi-postal, meaning a proportion of the cost of the stamp - in this case €1 – will be donated to the Austrian organisation "Nachbar in Not" and the international organisation UNICEF.





Moldova for Peace

Moldova Post Office launched their stamp on 19 April with the aim of 'promoting peace in the world and in our homes through each letter sent.' Of the 250,000 copies of the stamp printed, 5,000 were given to refugees and volunteers, so they can send letters to those still in Ukraine.



1924 Paris Olympics, the last of the modern Olympics that paid homage to the ancient Greeks

The ancient or the modern. It is easy to both idealize the ancient and get bogged down with the modern. It was understandable that a modern elite might view backwards toward Greece as a roadmap toward self improvement. So slip on your smoking jacket, fill your pipe, take your first sip of your adult beverage, and sit back in your most comfortable chair. Welcome to todays offering of The Philatelist.

An athlete celebrating his victory wearing a toga. Not how the Olympics are seen today. A fitting way to show the games as they were the last ones organized by the Frenchman Pierre, Barron de Coubertin, the founder of the modern Olympics. Coubertin believed that emulating the ancients was a way to uplift modern elites to be better. The 1928 Olympic stamps showed modern athletes and showed additional modernity by having a surcharge to help pay for the elite's games. I don't think the Barron would have approved.



Todays stamp is issue A27, a 50 Centimes stamp issued by France on April 1st, 1924. It was part of a four stamp issue for the Olympics in various denominations. According to the Scott catalog, the stamp is worth \$5.75 used. A imperforate version of this stamp is worth \$1,000.

Pierre de Coubertin was a French nobleman who was dismayed by the French loss in the Franco-Prussian War. In the same period the British Empire was at it's height. He attributed the relative success of Britain to the elite public school system that many of it's leaders passed through. The English public schools had played each other in athletics modeled after how they imagined the ancient Greek Olympic games. Coubertin thought the lack of athletics in the equivalent French schools left the aristocracy worthless and weak. He conceived a revived Olympics as a way to turn the system around. The events chosen were demonstrations of manly strength and soldierly skills. Intrinsic in the vision were amateur athletes and gentlemanly sportsmanship that tended to keep out potential participants from the working classes.

Coubertin's vision of the modern Olympics was naturally watered down after his retirement. One of the most famous stories from the 1924 Olympics was told by the movie "Chariots of Fire" from 1981. The movie told the story of a Jewish English runner who competed and won despite his wealthy but less than Noble background. He further offended by hiring a coach as part of his training, that some felt violated the spirit of the amateur athlete. The story is told as a hero overcoming anti-Semitism and was that, but also demonstrates that the times were changing.

The 1924 Olympics were played at the Stade Olympique de Columbas first built in 1907. The stadiums renovations have seen it shrink from 50,000 to 15,000 seats. It is still slated to host the field hockey event when Paris hosts the 2024 Summer Olympics. The 1924 Olympics only had revenue of 50 % of the costs of the games, despite large crowds. The much more commercial 1928 games, after Coubertin's retirement, almost broke even. Something gained, something lost.

A Greek island rebels against Turk rule, sounds like a job for a Danish, no excuse me Greek Prince? I don't think so and neither did the Cretans, but the Great Powers thought they knew better. This is a fake stamp. Issued at the time of the Theriso revolt, and of no postal value and does not have any catalog value. Being therefore a revenue raiser. I would have expected less ostentation and more revolutionary zeal.

Crete was a Christian/Greek island that was long a part of the Ottoman Empire. In 1897 the Cretans revolted against the Turks. At this point the Great Powers stepped in with troop deployments ending Turk rule, though a suzerainty to the Ottomans was still paid. This occupation was under a High Commissioner, Prince George, the second son of the King of Greece and also a Prince of Denmark. He was a lot more Danish than Greek and so many Cretans were less than satisfied with the arrangement. Prince George was quite imperious, immediately demanding the Cretans build him a palace. Where after all is a Royal to lay his weary head. He also proved unable to get the Great Powers to agree to union with Greece. The Cretans rebelled against Prince George and a civil war was on. This was not what the Great Powers signed up for and they ended up paying the Cretans for the right to leave and to take Prince George with them. Greece sent another high commissioner, this time an actual Greek and then the Cretans unilaterally declared union with Greece.

Prince George ended up settling in France where he married Marie Bonaparte. She was perhaps more famous than he was. She was chronically unsatisfied sexually despite 2 children with allegedly homosexual Prince George, and many affairs with Princes, Prime Ministers and stablemasters. She began a formal study of the then important psychological issue of female frigidity in conjunction with Sigmund Freud. She studied the sexual histories of several hundred women and the physical distance between their clitoris and vagina. She discovered the greater the distance the greater chance of frigidity. She published the findings under the pseudonym A. E. Narjani in a medical journal. If the distance between the organs was greater than 2.5 centimeters, orgasm was difficult to achieve. World Doll Day

Yes, we do have a World Doll Day. It is celebrated every year on the second Saturday in June since 1986.

There is an interesting story of how posts/chain letters played a role in commemorating a day for dolls. <u>Mildred Seeley</u>, an avid doll collector, and doll-related entrepreneur thought of having a special day for the dolls. She started sending out letters asking people to participate in the doll day and requested each person who have received the letter to spread the word to 5 more people. This spread like a wildfire and the very first world doll day was celebrated on **June 14, 1986**.

Can you believe that dolls have been around since 2000BC? Archeologists found the oldest dolls in Egyptian tombs. Thereafter dolls have been made from several materials like wood, clay, porcelain, leather, cloth, metals, plastics, nuts, and even bones. Inuit make dolls from soapstone and bone, dressed in fur.

In India, we have an International Doll Museum in New Delhi, our capital city. Celebrated political cartoonist, K. Shankar Pillai received a doll as a gift from the Hungarian ambassador. Since then, he became passionate about collecting dolls. This museum was founded by him in 1965, with over 6500 dolls from over 85 countries.

What is your favorite doll? It's time to cherish them.
