

At the September LSCC Meeting

Six regulars and a visitor from the PSLC were in attendance for the September meeting of the LSCC. We had all come to welcome a visitor from the Reading Stamp Collectors Club, Mike Bach, who delivered a splendid presentation on the topic of the 1890 Jubilee Celebration of the Penny Post. Mike is a native of England and specializes in Queen Victoria, Edward VII, and George V. But his true philatelic love is the Penny Black.

Mike noted that there was a Jubilee Issue commemorating the 50th year of the reign of Queen Victoria in 1887. ** The Penny Post Jubilee, which was officially celebrated from 16 – 19 May 1890 in London, featured a "Conversazione" held on the 16th which was attended by the Prince of Wales and "3,000 specially invited guests", and an exhibition open to the general public on the 17th and 19th, that included some interesting exhibits; unfortunately, a description of the "Post Office of 1990" exhibit has not survived to satisfy our curiosity of what the inhabitants of the previous century thought it might look like.

The Duke and Duchess of Edinburgh attended a second Conversazione and Exhibition on the evening of 2 July 1890, which was held to benefit a benevolence fund established in the name of the British inventor of the adhesive postage stamp, Sir Rowland Hill. The Penny Postage Jubilee was a rare event where royalty and the common people mingled together happily:

May it please your Royal and Imperial Highness, we, the undersigned, who are old officers of the Post Office, desire to welcome your Royal and Imperial Highness to this, the celebration of the Jubilee of Uniform Penny Postage. We desire to thank your Royal and Imperial Highness for your condescension in coming amongst the officers of the Post Office and in lending approval to the Rowland Hill Benevolent Fund by your gracious presence."

(From a letter presented to the Duchess of Edinburgh signed by officers of the Post Office who entered the service more than 50 years prior, including Mr. Frederick Hill, the sole surviving brother of the late Sir Rowland Hill)

Mike collects the postal memorabilia from these two events, which include a special postcard and cancel for the May exposition, and a Jubilee card and envelope for the July event. I invite you to review the PowerPoint presentation linked below to see the various covers that he has collected. A very interesting cover, on slide 37, was mailed during the war in 1942, and didn't arrive back with the sender until over five years later, in 1947!

While there were plenty of commoners in attendance at these events, they were not affordable to everyone. It was not cheap to attend a Conversazione, or even acquire a souvenir cover. The Jubilee envelope with the five special cancels on it cost 19 pence, which is about \$80 in today's USD. A ticket to the Conversazione in July cost 7 shillings and 6 pence, which is about \$420 in today's USD. Mike noted that he always researches covers before he buys them, and it is evident from the quality of his collection that he has an eye for covers that have an interesting story behind them.

** Queen Victoria reigned for 63 years, 216 days (23,226 days), until her death in 1901, and the length of her reign is surpassed only by the late Queen Elizabeth II, who was on the throne for 70 years, 214 days (25,782 days).



A decades-old postcard returns home

Occasionally you will hear the story of a piece of mail that was delivered to an address long after it was first put into the mail system, or an object that was lost or stolen from an individual long ago that was finally returned to its rightful owner. These stories are used as space- or spot-fillers (I guess the word nowadays would be "content") for news providers and websites, have value and are interesting as human-interest pieces. This story is a variation of that.

Last month while checking eBay I found a postcard that was addressed to my grandparents. I took a screenshot of it and sent it via text message to my mom, brothers, and sister, who all found it interesting, and wondered where I found it and how it ended up there.

My best guess is that it was in a bag of postcards that my grandma sold to one of our neighbors when we lived in South Lebanon Township in the middle of the 1980's. I guess those postcards are probably all over the country by now, and I just happened to find this one hanging out in cyberspace. After grandma sold them, I think my dad realized that selling them was a mistake when I bought a few of them back from our neighbor at his garage sale.

The mailbox across the street from my grandparent's house belongs to me now, and the appearance of the row of mailboxes probably hasn't changed much since the days that this postcard first arrived here. It was mailed from Florida on February 15, 1960, and its return trip to Lebanon, via Wisconsin, was completed 62 ½ years later on September 26, 2022.

Coincidentally, I saw an item by Ron Breznay in the September edition of the Wyoming Valley Stamp Club newsletter about a First Day Cover addressed to him that a club member recently found in a lot of covers he bought at an auction. So now I have to ask, has anyone else ever found a piece of correspondence for sale that was addressed to them or their family?

Yet after years of wondering, several interesting documents confirming his appointment finally surfaced in some family estate materials. Grandson Rick Barrett will show these remarkable official documents, along with a number of very interesting philatelic items and other visuals, and talk of family-related postal history. personal tale which combines ancestry with stamp collecting.

November 9: "Elie Beatty – Cashier of Hagerstown Bank, 1807-1859", by Steve Kennedy

November 23: "Overview of Semi-Postal Stamps of the Philippine Islands", by George D. Hauber, Sr. Come Join us for an evening with member, collector, and PowerPoint Master, George Hauber as he shares this country's semi-postal stamps, each one with a with a surcharge to support a cause to maintain and enhance life on the Philippine Islands. The stamps tell of the 1519 discovery of the Philippines by Magellan followed by Spanish occupation, a discovery that also demonstrated that the world was round. The Spanish American War led to U.S. Administration until 1935. Shortly afterwards, WWII led to Japanese Occupation. Here the semi-postals supported the campaign to produce and conserve food and aid the Red Cross. A 1943 issue benefited the victim of the major flood on Luzon. Following the war came support for damaged libraries, war widows, children, orphans, and disabled veterans. Later semi-postals supported the Tuberculosis Society. This is a very telling story of a nation that survived many challenges and then thrived, and all this is seen in a host of beautiful stamp issues.

December 14: "Why Postcards Matter", by Dawn Hamman. This presentation is about the importance of the PPC in Rural America and the U.S. Post Office at the turn of the 19th Century.

December 28: "Blood Donation on Stamps and Covers", by Ken Martin
