

Ralph Dupas: A postcard from a Champ


You're probably wondering who Ralph Dupas is; I had the same thought when I purchased this postcard while visiting the American Philatelic Center in August of 2022. The postcard was addressed to Dupas' friend, Karl Rappleye of Belvidere, Illinois, and is postmarked New Orleans, LA, April 12, 1954. I was intrigued by the postcard and wanted to learn more about the boxer, considering I am a boxing fan and had never heard of Ralph Dupas.

Ralph Dupas (October 14, 1935 – January 25, 2008) was an American boxer from New Orleans, Louisiana. He won the world light middleweight championship in 1963. Dupas was considered one of New Orleans' best professional fighters and finished his career with a 104-23-6 record.

He was inducted into the World Boxing Hall of Fame in 2000 and the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame in 1994. Dupas was referred to as the Cajun Ghost. He was the second of eleven children and became a professional boxer in 1950 at the age of 14. The famed boxing trainer Angelo Dundee saw Dupas fight and became his trainer. Wow, imagine being good enough as a boxer to turn pro at the age of 14? In fact, Dupas had 51 fights between the ages of 14-17, and only lost four of them (1950-1954). Dupas wrote on the postcard "I'm fighting on 28 of April on T.V." Dupas, who was 18 at the time, was referring to his 55<sup>th</sup> professional fight on April 28, 1954, when he fought Dennis Pat Brady at the Coliseum Arena, New Orleans.

Dupas became a ranked contender in the lightweight division in 1953 and by 1955, after beating a variety of top fighters, ascended as the top-ranked lightweight in the world. In May 1958, Dupas fought Joe Brown for the lightweight title, but lost by eighth-round knockout. He also lost a 1962 welterweight title bout to Emile Griffith. Another championship opportunity came for Dupas when he won the title on a fifteen-round unanimous decision over Light Middleweight Champion Denny Moyer in New Orleans on April 29, 1963. However, Dupas lost the title in September of 1963 to Italian Sandro Mazzinghi by thirteenth-round knockout.

Another major fight Dupas battled during his boxing career was being barred from fighting whites in Louisiana in the 1950s when rumors surfaced his mother was "Negro." At the time Louisiana did not permit interracial athletics between blacks and whites based on a 1956 state law. After a court battle from 1957-1960, Dupas was eventually issued a birth certificate identifying him as white.



Dupas briefly retired in 1964 and worked as a card dealer in Las Vegas. He returned to the ring in 1966 and retired for good after five fights that year. After his boxing career, Dupas began to exhibit signs of pugilistic dementia. His brother Tony, also a former fighter, moved Dupas from Las Vegas back to New Orleans, and put him in a nursing home, where he died at age 72 on January 25, 2008.

The experience of purchasing this postcard is an example of the pleasure I receive obtaining canceled mail and learning things I did not know based on my research.
