
INCLEMENT WEATHER


HAPPY BIRTHDAY ABE

Abraham Lincoln was born on February 12, 1809 two hundred and fourteen years ago. His parents, Thomas & Nancy Lincoln lived in a log cabin in Hardin County, Kentucky. In his eighth year the family moved to Indiana, a non-slaveholding territory. His mother died when he was ten and his sister Sarah was left to run the household until Thomas remarried a year later. In 1830 the family moved to Illinois.

FROM LOG CABIN TO THE WHITE HOUSE-K52



Growing up Abraham had many jobs; working on a farm, splitting rails for fences, working in a store. No matter the job he always had a thirst for knowledge. After the Black Hawk War he was a General Store Owner, a Postmaster, a County Surveyor & finally he decided to be a lawyer.




Studying to become a lawyer Lincoln borrowed legal texts from attorneys and read law on his own. During this time he met Mary Todd who later became his wife. He was admitted to the Illinois bar in 1836. Abraham and Mary married on November 4, 1842 and they bought a house in Springfield near his law office. They had four sons; Robert, Edward, William and Thomas. Of the four only Robert lived to maturity. He became a business lawyer and later served as U.S. Secretary of War during the administrations of Garfield and Arthur. His home in Vermont, Hildene, is on the National Register of Historic Places.

Lincoln served in the Illinois State Legislature (1834-1842) and the U.S. House of Representatived (1847-1849).

In 1858 Lincoln ran against Stephen A. Douglas for Senator. He lost the election, but in debating with Douglas he gained a national reputation that won him the Republican nomination for President in 1860.






Known as the Great Emancipator, on January 1, 1863, President Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation that declared forever free those slaves within the Confederacy.


On November 6, 1860, Lincoln was elected the 16th president. Lincoln made a stop in Harrisburg on the way to his 1861 inauguration. During the visit it was reported that an assassination plot was planned to take place in Baltimore. The travel plans were changed and Lincoln was transported thru Baltimore in the middle of night.

He was the first Republican president and his victory was entirely due to his support in the North and West. No ballots were cast for him in 10 of the 15 Southern slave states, and he won only two of 996 counties in all the Southern states, an omen of the impending Civil War.





Lincoln never let the world forget that the Civil War involved an even larger issue. This he stated most movingly in dedicating the military cemetery at Gettysburg: "that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain—that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom—and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth."




On Good Friday, April 14, 1865, Lincoln was assassinated at Ford's Theatre in Washington by John Wilkes Booth, an actor, who was a supporter of the South. Mortally wounded he was taken to the Petersen House where he died the next morning.



The late President lay in state, April 19 through April 21 – first at the White House and then at the Capitol. Lincoln's body traveled for three weeks on the *Lincoln Special* funeral train. The train followed a circuitous route from Washington D.C. to Springfield, Illinois, stopping at many cities for memorials attended by hundreds of thousands. Many others gathered along the tracks as the train passed.

Lincoln was buried on May 4, 1865 at Oak Ridge Cemetery in Springfield, ILL.




