GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC FORMED

G. A. R. was formed in 1866 in Decatur, Illinois.

- Lobbying for veterans' pensions.
- Supporting political candidates.
- GAR Influence peaked in 1890 with membership of 409,487.



- Linking men through their experience of war.
- G.A.R. among first organized U.S. advocacy groups.
- Black veteran's voting rights.
 Patriotic education.

For 83 years the G.A.R. met yearly in national "Encampments" rotating sites around the country. In August 1948 the GAR's 82nd National Encampment passed resolution urging Post Office Department to honor their final encampment, in 1949 with a commemorative stamp.


To authorize the issuance of a special series of stamps comimemorative of the Grand Army of the Republic.

1 Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives 2 of the United States of America in Congress assembled, 3 That the Postmaster General is authorized and directed to 4 issue a special series of 3-cent postage stamps, of such 5 design as he shall prescribe, in commemoration of the 6 Grand Army of the Republic, and such stamp be first 7 offered to the public at Indianapolis, Indiana, on August 8 28, 1949, on the occasion of the final National Encamp-9 ment of the Grand Army of the Republic.

Senator Langer, ND - May 24th.



3-CENT GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC COMMEMORATIVE STAMP

The Department will issue a 3-cent stamp through the Indianapolis, Ind. post office, on August 29, 1949, to commemorate the Final National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic.

The stamp will be 0.84 by 1.44 inches in dimensions, arranged horizontally, printed by the rotary process in red, electric-eve perforated, and issued in sheets of 50 subjects. The printing of 110,000,000 G. A. R. stamps has been authorized.

The central design depicts a G. A. R. veteran as he is today; old, wrinkled, head bowed, near the end of his road. Behind him, he is shown in his youth, as a Union soldier; bathed in light, looking upward, confident and strong, at the beginning of his long road. Across the top of the stamp is the wording "Final National Encampment Of The" in white-face Gothic. In the upper left corner of the design is an hourglass representing time, most of which has run out, as indicated by the sand in the lower half. Across the face of the hourglass are the letters "G A R" in dark Gothic. Centered below the glass is the denomination "36" in dark modified Roman with the word "Cents" in dark Gothic underneath. In a panel at the bottom appears the wording "United States Postage" in white-face Gothic on a dark background.

Stamp collectors desiring first-day cancellations of this stamp may send a limited number of addressed envelopes, not in excess of 10, to the Postmaster, Indianapolis, Ind., with postal note or money order remittance to cover the cost of the stamps to be affixed. Postage stamps and personal checks will not be accepted in payment. Envelopes submitted should be of ordinary letter size and each must be properly addressed. An enclosure of medium weight should be placed in each envelope and the flap either sealed or turned in. An outside envelope must not be sent for return of first-day covers. The envelope to the Postmaster, Indianapolis, Ind., should be endorsed "First Day Covers." Collectors should refrain from requesting hand cancellations since covers will be machine canceled so far as practicable. Orders for first-day covers must not include requests for uncanceled stamps.

For the benefit of collectors desiring stamps of selected quality for philatelic use, the 3-cent G. A. R. commemorative stamp will be available at the Philatelic Agency, Post Office Department, Washington 25, D. C., on and after August 30, 1949. To insure prompt shipment, mail orders to the Agency should include no other stamp issues. The Philatelic Agency does not service first-day covers.

Postmasters at direct- and central-accounting post offices will receive an initial supply of the G. A. R. stamps on orders prepared in the Department. Therefore, postmasters at these offices will not submit requisitions for the same. Direct- and central-accounting postmasters are furnished commemorative stamps as fast as they can be manufactured. They are, therefore, requested to refrain from reporting the nonreceipt of shipments until a reasonable time has elapsed after the first day of issue.

Postmasters at district-accounting post offices may obtain needed quantities of the 3-cent G. A. R. commemorative stamps by requisition on the central-accounting postmaster.

Postmasters will please post a copy of this notice on the bulletin beard, give information to the press, and notify all local stamp clubs regarding the ssuance of the 3-cent Grand Army of the Republic commemorative stamp Postmasters are cautioned not to place the stamp herein announced on sale before August 30, 1949. 850301° (Ed. 3.000.)


- The GAR commemorative went on sale August 29, 1949, the opening day of GAR Final Encampment, Indianapolis, IN.

James A. Hard

Birth: July 15, 1843 - Death: March 12, 1953. Last surviving combat veteran, outliving all but one of 2,675,000 Union soldiers. Claimed birth in 1841. Census figures show he may have lied about his age to enlist. (Last survivor a musician enlisted final weeks of war.) Enlisted four days before Ft. Sumter. Private in 32nd New York Infantry, fought at Bull Run, Fredericksburg, Chancellorsville, South Mountain and Antietam.

Theodore Augustus Penland

Birth: January 23, 1849 Goshen Elkhart County, Indiana Death: September 13, 1950 Vancouver, Clark County, Washington

Last Commander-in-Chief of GAR. At death he had almost fifty living descendants. Father John Penland, a Union soldier, died as a result of wounds at Battle of Stone's River. Penland, just 16 years old lied about age to enlist. Enlisted Company A, 152nd Indiana Volunteer Infantry at Goshen, Indiana, mustered out August 2, 1865 at Charlestown, West Virginia. Post-war vocations of farming, railroad work, and lure of adventure, drew him repeatedly the west. t. a, Conland

GAR Stamps signed by Theodore Penland

In 1868 he walked from Indiana to California, lived briefly Cheyenne, Wyoming, and resided in both Sacramento, California and Nevada. He worked in Sierra Nevada Mountains on Union Pacific Railroad through 1869 when golden spike completed the transcontinental line at Promontory Point. Postmarked at Theodore Penland's hometown return address is hand written by him.





Albert Woolson

Birth: February 11, 1847 Watertown, New York Father moved family to Minnesota. Albert's father joined
Union forces from Minnesota in 1861, injured at Shilo he returned home. Joined Janesville, Minnesota, August 10, 1863 age 16 in drum corp. Head Drummer Chattanooga November 1863 and Drum Major during Sherman's march. Mustered out at Nashville in September 1865. Post war Albert worked mills and logging camps northern Michigan.

Joseph Clovese

Birth: January 30, 1844 St. Bernard Parish, Louisiana

Death: July 13, 1951 Burial: <u>Perry Mount Park Cemetery</u> Oakland County, Pontiac, Michigan

Private, Co C, 9th Corps d'Afrique, Louisiana (Union), and later Private, Co C, 63rd USCIVolunteers; he received pension from 1911 until his death.

Joseph (Uncle Joe) Clovese, last surviving Negro Union veteran, died July 13, 1951 Dearborn Veterans Hospital. 107 years old Michigan's last survivor of Civil War. Home was Pontiac. Born a slave St. Bernard Parish, La. Deserted his master to join GA Union Army during Siege of Vicksburg. In Union Army, as drummer, then infantryman. A private Co. "C", 63rd Colored Infantry Regiment. Postmarked at Joseph (

Charles L. Chappel

Birth: July 7, 1847 - Death: September 19, 1949 Company D, New York 10th Infantry.

Commander Stanton Post 55, Long Beach.

On Sept 19, 1949 refused treatment for heart attack and after a second hours later, taken to Naval Hospital where he died. Prior days seen scooting about streets in electric three-wheeler.

September 2nd flew back from last encampment. Chappel's had hoped to be National Commander. Comdr. Penland, let him hold the gavel symbolically closing his career as a delegate. Chappel was also Commander of California-Nevada Department of GAR. At 17, Chappel enlisted Company B, 10th New York Infantry, as a private. Stood picket duty at Appomattox Courthouse April 9, 1865, when Gen. Robert E. Lee surrendered.



In some case these unofficial sites were Navy ships that would have had access to a supply of the new issues.





The final encampment of the G.A.R. lasted from August 29, 1949 to September 1, 1949. The cover seen here sports a last day cachet and was machine canceled on the September 1, 1949 in Decatur, Illinois birth place of the Grand Army of the Republic.

On August 2, 1956 the G.A.R. came to a formal end on the death of Albert Woolson at the age of 109. This cover, postmarked August 2, 2016 commemorates the 60th anniversary of the end of the G.A.R.
