A Tribute to Annville

Annville – Formerly Millerstown – Renamed for Ann Miller, wife of the founder. Founded in 1762. (Town marker)




Annville Township was divided into North Annville Township and South Annville Township in 1845. In 1912, a new Annville Township was formed from parts of North Annville and South Annville, and is the town of Annville we know today. The Main Street corridor of Annville from the Quittapahilla Creek on the west to Saylor Street on the east has been placed on the National Register of Historic Places. A really old view of Main Street, with mud, trolley tracks, and horse-drawn wagons.




A not as old view of Main Street, recognizable to those of us who are familiar with the area, with pavement, traffic lights, and Volkswagens.

Four hearty members of the Lebanon Stamp Collectors Club were treated to a discussion about the future of our favorite hobby by Scott English. Scott and his wife Kendra traveled all the way from Bellefonte to spend the evening with us at the library. While this is the first meeting that

Scott has been able travel to from the center of the state, he has been a member of the LSCC since 2020.

Scott has had a very successful tenure as the executive director of the American Philatelic Society. Success often breeds optimism, and Scott shared plenty of reasons for us to be optimistic about the future of stamp collecting! The ideas that Scott communicated with us may inspire a future editorial or two, but I'll share one or two takeaways from the meeting here.

A couple reasons that are commonly cited as symptoms of the hobby's decline are the lack of participation by younger people, and the decline in membership of the APS. Indeed, the top reason for the decline in APS membership is death. But while the APS currently has 26,579 members worldwide, the best estimate that Scott and the APS have of the number of active stamp collectors in the United States is 250,000. The hobby may be less organized than it was in the past, but that doesn't necessarily mean it's in danger of becoming irrelevant any time soon.

One encouraging piece of advice that Scott shared with us, and shares with other clubs, is to expand our reach. While the relatively short arm of the Lebanon Stamp Collectors Club might suit our local collecting community just fine, there are examples of clubs whose influence is felt far beyond their geographic borders.

Scott recognized the Philatelic Society of Lancaster County as one of those clubs. Many of you who are reading this newsletter received it from Paul through the PSLC's newsletter exchange. The PSLC provides a web presence for the LSCC and for other clubs in our area, as well as a hub in Southcentral PA for collectors from far and wide. It takes a fair amount of vision and even more effort to accomplish those things, and the recognition is well deserved. – Scott Ney

At my visit to the weekend stamp show in Lancaster at the end of April, I was surprised to see a familiar name posted on the side wall of the auditorium: WDW Philatelic. Surprised, because I recalled buying some small Austria lots on eBay from WDW in the past, and I knew from the letter enclosed with my purchases that Ward D. Wilcox, proprietor, was a teacher in Los Angeles by day, and a dealer in "Halfway Decent Material" by night. What was he doing in Lancaster, along with boxes and boxes of his wares?

I ended up spending a couple of hours chatting with him, catching up on what he's been up to, and learning about what it's like to sell stamps online, in Southern California, and here in Pennsylvania and the Northeast.

Mr. Wilcox is originally from the Wilkes-Barre area, and moved to California more than three decades ago. Now retired from his teaching job, he's moved back home to PA, and is in the midst of getting his feet wet in the regional show scene and working on his online sales platforms. Both of these aspects of dealing have been a challenge. To cite just one example, items that usually sold well at shows in Southern California haven't seen the same demand here in the East. As people stopped by his table while we were chatting, I came to the realization that the Lancaster shows cater to a very specialized crowd.

This was probably the best show that I've been to, on the strength of the enjoyable conversation I had with Mr. Wilcox. I learned a few things myself, and while I did spend a little money at his table on a country collection hinged to Minkus album pages, I wish I would have spent more. But I realize that my own collecting aims have narrowed as I mature in this hobby.
