

The U.S. Virginia Dare Stamp

Roanoke Island is an island in Dare County, bordered by the Outer Banks of North Carolina. The colonization effort began as a charter granted by Queen Elizabeth I in 1578 to explore and colonize territories "...unclaimed by Christian kingdoms...". After two failed attempts to establish the first English settlement in America, 117 people, financed by Sir Walter Raleigh and led by Governor John White, reached the island in July 1587. The following month, White's granddaughter, Virginia Dare, became the first English person born in America.

#### THE PRECANCELED BATTLESHIP REPORT

"G.H. MUMM & CO."

G.H. Mumm & Co., Reims, France, are vintners and have a champagne house that was founded in 1827. The company has a rich history and a connection to precanceled battleships. The Mumm family lineage dates back to the twelfth century. The family was engaged in the wine business as producers and merchants as early as 1761.

It is not certain when the export business began, but Mumm & Co. has become one of the largest exporters of sparkling wines in the world. There does not appear to be any evidence of fiscal activity during the Civil War (G.L. Toppan, H.E. Deats and A. Holland [1]), so it is safe to say that its export business to the U.S. began sometime after the Civil War Revenue Tax was repealed in 1872. There is, however, considerable evidence of fiscal activity during the Spanish-American War (1898-1901). According to Chappell and Joyce [2], G.H. Mumm employed the use of one-cent and two-cent proprietary stamps with three precancel types. Type 1 is a three line cancel in serif type with the year on the last line. Type 2 is a four line cancel with the day and month on the last line. Type 3, Figures 2 and 3, is a three line cancel with the date on the last line. Stamps with type 3 cancels are the only examples that we have seen.



Figure 2. Type 3 red precancels on 1-cent proprietary stamps. All of these stamps were used late in the tax period, as indicated by the dates and the fact that the cancels appear on hyphen-hole perf 7 stamps. The condition of the stamps is very poor in some cases. Remember that these stamps were used on bottles of champagne. You'd have to be a special person to care about the stamp when opening a bottle of champagne.

Figure 3. Type 3 dark blue precancels on two cent proprietary stamps. The condition of these stamps is very poor. The stamps with early dates are rouletted 5 ½, indicating usage early in the tax period.

Mumm champagne continued to be exported to the U.S. into the twentieth century and beyond, Figure 4.

The Mumm family befriended the famous Japanese-French artist Leonard (Tsuguharu) Foujita early in the twentieth century. Foujita converted to Catholicism later and was given a tract of land on the Champagne House property on which the Foujita Chapel was built. The walls of the chapel are adorned with frescos which Foujita himself painted. One of the most famous of these frescos is "The Virgin in the Grapes," Figure 6. This work is significant here because it inspired the top of the bottle in Figure 7. Foujita is responsible for the motif which has been used to decorate the bottle of Mumm Cordon Rouge, Figure 7, since 1958. The connection that Foujita has to Mumm & Co. was so strong that there is a bottle named after him, Figure 8.

It was the motivation for the gold foil on the top of the bottle in Figure 7.

G.H. Mumm & Co. has been established as one of the premier producers of sparkling wine. Through a joint venture between G.H. Mumm & Cie and Joseph E. Seagram, G.H. Mumm is one of the leading producers of champagne in the Napa Valley of California. This region has been deemed ideal for producing this variety of wine and their product has been very well received. The company is currently ranked among the top five exporters of champagne in the world. The company's interest in art and eye for design remains current with their 2022 creation—a bottle of "Champagne for Space."




