JAMES RUDISILL, LCPC MEMBER #66 1924-2023

Although Jim Rudisill (image 1) didn't attend meetings, he was a faithful face at our Expos., and a few picnics.

He and I met in 1984, I was enlisted to appraise and prepare a 2-day auction of the paper ephemera in his Aunt Anne's collection. Anne Rudisill had been a faithful customer since 1960. She collected postcards, postal stamps, covers, medals and tokens — world-wide, with an emphasis on Royalty and, in particular, Great Britain . Jim and I became good friends. He taught high school art for many years, but was known as Mr. York; there was never a local Subject that could stump Jim. When he sound the wide variety in postcards, he was hooked. That was July 1990.

He was LCPC's in-house artist. Just a small sampling of his work is shown here. Volume II – Windows to Our Past, includes his art. We're still using his "Award" postcard.

Most of you are not aware of Jim's talent as a silhouette artist. Some of us marveled at the 5 or 6 minute renditions he>d cut out while we sat for that short time. We show here most of the work he did for early club presidents as well as other eager members willing to have his hand in posterity ... on a postcard.

Charlie Griffiths (image 2) and I (image 16) spent many Thursdays outlining our ideas for a postcard club at his home in Manor Township.








JIM MORRISON

Farewell to local 'Keeper of Christmas'

Founder of National Christmas Center drew thousands of visitors for old-fashioned cheer

Jim Morrison, known to generations as "the Keeper of Christmas" in his role as founder and former curator of the beloved National Christ-mas Center, has died. He was 85. Morrison died Oct. 13 of natural causes at Kadima Rehabilitation & Nursing Home at Lititz, where he spent the last two years of his life, according to those closest to him.

The National Christmas Center opened its doors in 1998 in a 20,000-square-foot building in Paradise Township, where it remained for the next 20 years. During that time thousands of people made their way through the museum to marvel at the antique decorations from Christmases past. The center now operates seasonally in Dauphin County near the county line.

The center had been a lifelong vision for Morrison that first developed as a child in New Jersey, when his mother drove him to Philadelphia the day after Thanksgiving to see the holiday-themed store displays.

"Everybody flocked to see the start of Christmas," Morrison told LNP | LancasterOnline in 2018. "My mother did so much to make Christmases great." In the days after Christmas, a young Morrison would roam neighborhood streets lined with discarded Christmas trees and plucked from them any ornaments he could find.

He opened the Christmas Center in Lancaster County in order to bring back the true spirit of Christmas he felt had been lost in commercialism. There was a reason behind the center's location, as the area has historical ties to Christmas.

"The first documented Christmas tree in America was in Lancaster (city) in 1821," Morrison was quoted saying to LNP | LancasterOnline in 2018. "It was the Germans that started the tree. Possibly Martin Luther by putting candles on the tree. So many things happen with immigration. They brought their traditions to Lancaster. They would wrap the tree in cotton to look like the new-fallen snow. All the references came from Lancaster and those trees. It's just a strong Christmas tradition in this area. And I wanted people to learn about that."

Decades of Christmas

For 20 years, Morrison estimated tens of thousands of people made their way through the museum each year to marvel at the antique decorations that took visitors on a journey through Christmas history; the center was featured in national magazines and on the Travel channel. The center still operates each Christ-mas season in a leased warehouse in Dauphin County that's about 5 miles north of Stone Gables Estate.

A celebration of life to remember Morrison, open to the public, will be held at the Star Barn, 1 Hollinger Lane, West Donegal Town-ship, 2–5 p.m. Nov. 20.
