Lebanon Stamp Collectors Club receives proclamation

On Feb. 20, the Lebanon Stamp Collectors Club was presented with a Proclamation from city Mayor Sherry Capello in honor of the club's 50 years as a member-club of the American Philatelic Society (A.P.S.), headquartered in Bellefonte, Pennsylvania.

The Lebanon Stamp Club has existed in Lebanon in some form or another (under different names) since the 1930s. All through the 1970s, 1980s and into the 1990s our club held a well-attended annual stamp exhibition at one of the Lebanon malls.

It is said that there are around 5 million collectors in the USA alone. The A.P.S. has over 30,000 members worldwide.

Theclub meets in the Lebanon Community Library the third Tuesday of each month, except December from 6:30 to 8 p.m. Meetings are open to the public who are interested in learning more about the hobby. Our members' collecting interests are wide ranging: Lebanon Postal History, Lititz Postal History, Worldwide telegraph stamps, Baltimore Carrier Stamps, Mexico Express Companies, worldwide errors, the Hershey connection in Cuba, as well as country collections of the USA, Canada, Great Britain and France and other smaller collections.

The club has members from Harrisburg to the west, Myerstown to the east, Lancaster to the south, as well as Lebanon.

An update from Dick Colberg

In a previous report from this side of the pond I told of a philatelic magazine editor's comment about the future of stamp bourses (doomsday). He was quite negative. I had estimated the attendance of the bourse I attended at about 1,500 people. I said I thought that was good. Well, all the numbers are in, and the count was over 4,000! So much for doomsday any time soon!

Now the same editor is complaining about the location of the next French national stamp exhibit. This exhibit, much like the APS's GASS, used to be held at various cities around France. The exhibit will be held in Colmar, France, on the German border in the northeast of France. I've traveled to and exhibited at some of the French Nationals. It's a nice way for my wife and I to see different areas of France we would not normally get to. The last few nationals have been held at a large exhibit space on the edge of Paris. It is easily served by bus and Metro (subway). I've been fortunate to be able to get a ride from a fellow collector and he knows his way around Paris quite well. Now, I guess it's a travelling show again. The editor was complaining about collectors having to travel out of their way to attend this show. What, he thinks all collectors live in and around Paris?

This guy would sing a different tune if he lived in the U.S. Most national shows in the USA involve serious travel distances. I attended a show in San Diego last year and it involved a cross-country plane trip and a 4-day weekend. France is a fraction of the size of the continental USA and most cities are no more than a few hours ride apart on a very nice train.

I think I've told you that I've written several articles for the French philatelic journal L'Echo de la Timbrologie. I subscribe to this journal on an annual basis. Last week I received a letter from the publisher saying that as of issue #2001, the journal was ceasing publication. Lo and behold, today (1/2/25) I received issue #2001 and the editor's letter stated that this was it. Finis!

I'm scratching my head on this one. Here is some history on the subject. There was a competing philatelic journal. *Tombres Magazine*, available on newsstands and by subscription. I bought it occasionally. I thought it was equally well written, and the articles added to my knowledge. *L'Echo de la Timbrologie* is published by the French catalogue publisher Yvert et Tellier (Y&T for short). L'Echo has been published since 1893.

Y&T bought its rival, *Tombres Magazine*, in 2020 and continued publishing under the same name. I didn't understand the logic, but I guess that's business. So, now Y&T is going to continue publishing a monthly stamp journal, but continuing under the younger magazine's name.

An update on our local scouts and the Stamp Collecting merit badge

Back in April 2022, we welcomed four local Scouts from Troop 412, sponsored by Salem Lutheran Church, to our monthly meeting, to help them fulfill the requirements of the Stamp Collecting merit badge. LEBANON STAMP CLUB CONTINUES TO GROW


The Lebanon Philatelic Society held an interesting meeting Thursday night. There were twenty-eight members present and two new members were admitted.

The Lebanon Stamp Club in 1933

The earliest clipping from the *Lebanon Daily News* that I have found on Newspapers.com concerning the Lebanon Stamp Club is this clipping from Saturday, February 18, 1933. In less than a month, on March 4, the U.S. would swear into the presidency a man who collected stamps, and I am sure the enthusiasm that a Stamp Collector President brought to the hobby helped propel philately through its golden years of the 1930s through the 1950s. It is nice to see that the club established a way for more experienced members to mentor the beginning collectors in the ranks. I have personally observed that the LSCC is still a place where a beginning collector can learn and benefit from the knowledge and enthusiasm possessed by our more seasoned associates. – Scott Ney

The pages of the Lebanon Daily News contain a record of our LEBPEX expos of the past. I have compiled a collection of the articles and advertisements pertaining to the show that I have found, which I will share with the club as a companion to the LEBPEX show cover catalog that I "published" last year. As illustrated above, we can learn about stamp exhibits prior to the very first LEBPEX in 1973 by searching the files of the *Daily News*, and I will include these in the record as well.

Dear fellow collectors,

We are planning a bus trip to the Boston 2026 World Expo. We will be going to the Boston 2026 show for two days (May 23 and 24th) which means we'll need lodging for three nights. Departure will be May 22nd. The official room rate is \$279.95 per night within walking distance of the Boston Convention Center. Two or more people can split a room. White Star tours is going to provide a quote on a bus with insurance in late spring of 2025. The max bus load would be 50 people with a min of 40. The bus would make a stop in Allentown to pick up their people.

The cost per person should be around \$600 plus meals, assuming that two people share a room, and the bus cost is in the vicinity of \$200 per person.

We need a head count of people interested by the end of February 2025 to determine if we have a chance of getting a minimum of 40 people.

The show's hotels will start taking reservations in June of 2025. One night must be paid at the time of reservation. Plus, we will be collecting for the bus reservation at that time. If you have any questions, please contact me at silx404@aol.com.
