Club members and friends of PSLC: We are duly honored to have at our meeting this month, Scott and Kendra English. Scott has designated Lancaster as a stop on his farewell tour; he will soon embark on the next chapter of his life after a very successful tenure as Executive Director of the American Philatelic Society. He'll be leaving shortly after the conclusion of The Great American Stamp Show this summer, so please come join us on the special but bittersweet occasion of his final visit to the Philatelic Society of Lancaster County.

Many hobby activities are coming up this season with the next K² Stamp Show on June 22nd followed by another in August; The Philatelic Gathering on April 19th; Cemil Betanov's digital presentation: "Overprints on Newspaper Wrappers" on April 23rd; the PSLC's Outdoor Bourse in Millersville on Sunday, May 18th; the PSLC Summer Picnic in August; and much more. Our meeting programs are booked through the end of the year, and we already have four presentations and another "on-deck" for our 2026 calendar year. Let me share with you an interesting question for stamp collectors that came my way; it is also a fun question to dissect due to the variety of responses it garners. It may also be a good question

for discussion, at least in part, on both scientific and/or psychological grounds, and some of the answers may positively impact the growth of philately.

Several years ago, during the break at one of my Smithsonian meetings, one of the other philatelic advisory board members remarked to me: "Charlie, you're a geneticist, aren't you? Well, do you think that there is such a thing as a stamp collecting gene?" To me this was a loaded question, but a good one, nevertheless. It might be best asked in operational terms: "Does stamp collecting run in families?"

I did some quick math in my head and ran through my mental Rolodex of the stamp collectors I know or have known, while trying to remember if their parents, siblings, or their offspring collected stamps. After conducting a rapid mini-pilot study in my mind, in which nothing stood out to me other than a few minor trends, I concluded that there was nothing statistically significant to support the existence of a "stamp collecting gene". In the next minute I tried to build a research design to scientifically investigate this. Would this study be at the genetic level in the laboratory, or would I toy with Venn Diagrams and genograms to explain it in fancy statistical terms? I had no idea. Like awakening from a dream, my thoughts then returned to the business at hand, and I can't recall how I answered this colleague. But the question of the "stamp collecting gene" has lingered ever since the day it was first asked.

We know that physical characteristics may run in families, and diseases and disorders can pass down the family line. In the latter, much genetic engineering is undertaken to address them. We know that nature is random, and a blue-eyed couple may not have a blue-eyed child. When we discuss behaviors and lifestyle choices in families, we encounter other variables and perhaps different research paradigms in our quest for this "collecting gene." And here I need to consult, or perhaps even default to my developmental psychology colleagues for their input.

These developmental psychologists research and intervene in the growth-related constructs of intelligence, language, motor activity, nurturing, preferences, locus of control, self-esteem, and a whole host of other relevant traits. A portion of this discipline conducts their studies with animals, and interestingly, some animal models of psychopathology are congruent with that of humans, but I can say for sure that I don't know of any animals that collect things for the sake of collecting them, except perhaps raccoons who like shiny objects. Next month I'll discuss what the psychologists shared with me about the topic. Cheerio, Dr. Charles J. DiComo.

Overprints on Newspaper Wrappers Cemil Betanov

Stamps and postal stationery get overprinted for a number of reasons. When postal rates change, items that prepay the old rate are unlikely to be needed in large quantities. Instead of discarding them, surcharging them to reflect the new rate makes a lot of sense. This saves users the trouble of adding stamps to make up the new rate. It saves also postal authorities the cost of printing new items. Cemil will show why philatelic items get overprinted, however, using only newspaper wrappers as examples.

THE PRECANCELED BATTLESHIP REPORT

"The J.C. Ayer Co."

Recently, Dr. Charles DiComo gave a presentation on Civil War Era Private Die Proprietary Medicine Stamps to the Philatelic Gathering of West Chester, PA. [1]. In many ways, this was a remarkable presentation. Those of us who have drifted in and out of this collecting interest appreciate the scarcity of many of the items in his collection. The condition of "Match and Medicine Stamps" from this generation is always mixed and faults are to be expected. Yet, Dr. Di Como's collection contained some of finest examples of this genre that we could ever expect to see, including complete packages with stamps that were free of faults. Of particular interest to me were the stamps of J.C. Ayer & Co., Lowell, Massachusetts. This company persisted on past the Civil War era and into the Spanish-American War. The purpose of this paper is to report on the company's use of precanceled Battleships during this period of time.

According to Chappell and Joyce [1], the J.C. Ayer Co. employed only one precancel style that was used on $\frac{1}{2}$, $\frac{1}{4}$, and $\frac{1}{2}$ cent proprietary Battleships (RB 21, 23, 25, 28). The cancel on the $\frac{1}{4}$ cent was only reportedly used on July 19, 1898, thus, the stamp is very scarce and I have never seen it. However, I have the cancel on all of the other denominations, Figures 1-4.

According to Hoyt [2], the J.C. Ayer Co. evolved into the Ayer Co. and marketed five major products: Cherry Pectoral, Cathartic Pills, Sarsaparilla, Ague Cure, and Hair Vigor. It is interesting to note that only Hair Vigor was a patented product. However, all of these products were successfully marketed and advertised (see Figures 5-7).




Figure 7. An Advertising Card for Ayer's Hair Vigor, the only patented Ayer Product.

The Ayer Co. survived the Pure Food and Drug Act of 1906 and continued to do business in the twentieth century. The company left Lowell, Massachusetts, around 1939. After the move, it appears that the company did not continue to produce medicinal products or hair tonic, thus closing the page on one of the most iconic companies of the era of patent medicines.



The March Philatelic Gathering

March 15, 2025... Members gathered at the Chester County History Center in West Chester, Pa., to hear two fantastic lectures. **Mike Wilson** gave a presentation based on an article he wrote for *First Day* titled, "Celebrating 50 Years of Airmail Service to Bermuda: A FDC Cover from 1975 and Maybe One from 1925?" Mike described flights of the airship USS Los Angeles from Lakehurst, New Jersey to Bermuda in February and April 1925 and the preparations made to carry mail to and from the island. He then described his research into whether a cover from April 1925 carried on the Los Angeles and labeled as a Bermudian "First Day Cover" was the real deal. He offered three pieces of circumstantial evidence that supported the assertion, but he couldn't prove it definitively. He concluded by describing the impact that the airship Los Angeles made on Bermuda, including the fact that it has been commemorated on two Bermudian stamps.

Our second speaker was **Tom Geiger** who described some "Things I've Found Interesting and Saved over 55 Years of Collecting." These included the first stamp he collected – the 1966 Johnny Appleseed U.S. commemorative, covers cancelled on Christmas Day and New Year's Day, a first day cover signed by Peanuts cartoonist Charles Schulz, several envelopes addressed to Dwight D. Eisenhower, and a number of humorous messages seen on postcards, among others. Tom also commented on his ongoing efforts with eBay projects that take up his time and a lot of space in the house!
