Quick 1 Page Specimen Refresher

- May 18, 1878: Universal Postal Union (UPU) met in Paris, adopted regulation that UPU members transmit "a collection of their postage stamps" to one another. UPU specimen stamps w/ "protective markings" came into existence
- **1884** British General Post Office, controlled specimen issuance, decided specimens would be distributed w/protective marking (overprint or handstamp).
- June 1884 March 1886 100 specimens were produced for each new issue, w/single specimen copy of each newly issued stamp sent to each UPU member
- April 1886 June 1892: 345 specimens were produced for each new issue, w/strip of 3 specimen sent to UPU member
- July 1892 September 1907: Between 716 and 756 were produced, w/strip of 5 of each sent to UPU member
- October 1907 July 1948: Between 339 and 451 were produced, decreasing to 3 of each sent to UPU member
- **1884 1928** Stamps were overprinted or hand stamped "SPECIMEN" in various shapes and sizes from type set forms.
- **1928 1948** Overprinting was replaced w/punched holes (perforations) forming "SPECIMEN" for security reasons
- July 15, 1948 Decision to cease SPECIMEN distribution due to cost was communicated to all UPU British Empire members in circular letter from the Colonial Office.
- **1884 1948** Specimens distributed to 109 different British Empire UPU members, from Aden to Zululand.
- 6,317 specimen stamps were distributed.

- Specimens were last featured in CAMEO September 1972, authored by Marcus Samuel, who developed British Empire specimen classification system & in 1976 published "Specimen Stamps of the Crown Colonies 1857-1948."



Ascension (1)

53 specimens distributed between 1922 -1946. 4 definitive sets, Silver Jubilee, Coronation & Victory Omnibus sets. 1st set 1922 St. Helena stamps of King George V overprinted "ASCENSION". All specimens were De La Rue type except for Silver Jubilee Waterlow & Sons perforation Type W8. All specimens except for the Silver Jubilee are catalogued over £450 (\$600)

The Gambia (2)

112 specimens distributed between 1886 -1946. 4 definitive sets, Silver Jubilee, Coronation & Victory sets. 1st set was the 6d in June 1886 & 1/2d, 1d & 2d in April 1887. All specimens are De La Rue type except for Silver Jubilee, Coronation & 1938 Definitive set, which have Bradbury, Wilkinson, & Co. type B9.

Gold Coast (3)

117 specimens distributed between 1888 & 1948. Oct 1888 1 & 2 shilling were the first to be distributed. All specimens are De La Rue type until 1921. 1928 Christianborg Castle set are the only specimens with the Harrison H2 Handstamp. The final UPU distributed protected specimens are from Gold Coast

Gold Coast

Throughout the course of UPU distributing specimens, 15 specimens were either returned, never issued, or destroyed. Two came from the West Africa.

Gold Coast 1913 10 shillings, type D12 overprint distributed June 10, 1911 (SG69s), but never issued. 389 specimens required for distribution. Only one example exists without the SPECIMEN overprint.

SG69 was part of a color change that was never finalized or that the plan to issue the stamp was canceled.

193 specimens distributed between 1886 & 1946. 1st stamps distributed with were Lagos 2s, 5s & 10s in October 1886. Specimen types for Nigeria & associated protectorates & territories:



St. Helena (5)

97 specimens distributed between 1887 & 1946. 1st stamps distributed were 1887 3d & 6d in May 1887. All specimens were De La Rue type except 1934 Centenary set (B9) & the 1938 - 44 Definitive set (W8, W8a).

St. Helena

The other specimen from the West African area that was distributed by the UPU but never issued was the St. Helena 1911 One pence red, D12a overprint distributed September 22, 1911. Marcus Samuel called this stamp the "all red error," printed by mistake, as a result of a misunderstanding between the local St. Helena postmaster and De La Rue in London. When the postmaster requested a further supply of the 1-pence carmine and black, specimens were supplied to the UPU for distribution, and a shipment was sent to St. Helena. On arrival, the "all red error" was discovered, and the stock was destroyed. Specimens were distributed to UPU members. 400 specimens required for distribution

Sierra Leone (6)

136 specimens, distributed between 1884 & 1946. 1st UPU British Empire set distributed was 1884 Perf 14 ½d. 1d, 2d and 4d June 1884 with 60 stamps distributed. An additional 40 were perforated on single-line Perf 12 perforating machine. Samuel states De La Rue had sent supply of stamps in May 1884, but did not have sufficient stock to meet the requirements. All specimens until 1932 were De La Rue. Others include 1932 Definitives (W8 low values, B9 high values), 1933 Wilberforce (B9), Silver Jubilee and Coronation (B9), 1938 - 1944 Definitives (W8, W8a, W9) and Victory (D21).

Togo (7)

Togo only had 1 set of specimens - The 12 stamps of the KGV Gold Coast definitive set, distributed August 11, 1917. This was during World War 1, when the British and French had occupied Togo. The specimens were the Gold Cost series (SG70s - 84s), overprinted TOGO ANGLO-FRENCH OCCUPATION

- 10 reis emerald-green, 20 reis carmine, 25 reis lilac, 40 reis yellow, 50 reis blue distributed 1881-1885
