The Veranda Chronicles

From now on, when I hear someone tell me that the hobby is dead or dying, I am going to have them: 1. Talk to some of the collectors who attended the Boston-2026 World Expo last month and 2. Visit the show's website (<https://boston2026.org>). Feedback from friends of mine who attended the show assigned great marks in almost every aspect, from the bourse to the exhibits, the auctions, the seminars and classes, the hospitality and social events, and much more. Parking at the show was only \$20/day, which was a bargain compared to 1986 when my family took me

into Manhattan to ascend the Empire State Building; lo and behold, parking in Manhattan 40 years ago was \$20/hour!

In Boston, there were nearly 1000 competitive worldwide exhibits, and in addition to those were 27 invited non-competitive exhibits of such quality that this section was named the Court of Honor. PSLC and GPSCC member Mark Schwartz was one such honoree for his exhibit entitled "Boston's use of the 1847 issue." There was a double treat for this show. Just as *InterPhil-1976* coincided with the Bicentennial in the historic city of Philadelphia during the Bicentennial, this decade's Expo in Boston coincided with the 250th Anniversary of our country. And just as in Philadelphia fifty years earlier, the celebratory and patriotic themes were manifest in Boston this year throughout the event. The USPS spaces were busy servicing covers and selling many patriotic stamps, while many worldwide countries produced and sold postage stamps celebrating the Boston-2026 Expo, the 250th U.S. Anniversary, or both. As the saying goes, "It don't get no better than this."

One of the big events on Sunday of the show was the release of a stamp issue, though it was not exactly a First Day Ceremony. The identity of the stamp was a highly guarded secret right up until it was revealed. USPS called this event "Stamp Encore." Last summer the Post Office identified 25 of what they considered the best sellers of the Millennium to date. They prepared ballots for the populace to pick the stamp from the lists and images for which they would like an "Encore." This is like the annual *Linn's Stamp News* popularity poll for readers' favorites of the stamps of that given calendar year. The winner for Stamp Encore was the Mister Rogers stamp which was first issued in 2018. Adding to the gaiety of the ceremony was an original cast member, actor David Newell who played Mr. Mc Feely (a.k.a. Speedy Delivery) for the duration of the show in addition to his work in production management. Some of you and perhaps many of your kids will remember Newell, Fred Rogers, and others from this iconic TV show which ran from 1968 through 2001. There were over 50K ballots cast in the Stamp Encore contest, and the Mr. Rogers stamp received 40K votes more than that which was in second place! In addition to the Mr. Rogers ceremony, there were six other First Day events at the eight-day Boston Expo.

And speaking of show images, on the Boston-2026 website, there are [links to the images](#) for each of the show-days with their special events. Further, there are an additional two links for the images of the pre-show activities and the teardown. This is one of the best visual overviews for those who were unable to attend. Most of the images were by show photographer Carlos Vergara, but the website page invites show-goers to submit their photos for inclusion in the posted photo montages. As each image contains the name of the photographer, it is obvious how many picture-takers contributed their photo images in addition to Mr. Vergara. This was a successful idea.

In these images, one can see, for example, the great crowds at the First Day Ceremonies and the large numbers of children and adults at the education center where show-goers could learn about the hobby and take home glassines of free stamps. To meet this need, the show planners set a goal a few years ago to seek five million stamps via donation to be achieved by late March this year. Our club participated, with Len Kasper beginning to compile our member's

contributions in early March, which he would sort, pack, and finally submit, right before the deadline in order to maximize PSLC's stamp contribution. But in February, he learned that the five million stamp goal was reached and no additional stamps were needed. So he double checked with them, "Are you sure you don't need any more stamps?" and was told not to send them. And guess what? He gave them to Paul for door prizes. So, some of you may get your stamps back at a future PSLC meeting.

By next month, I will have had time to read and digest the expected reviews in the myriad stamp journals and online sources, and I'll provide you with a synopsis, or what we call in the hospital business, a *post mortem*, of the numbers, dollars, dealer and customer surveys, and other Expo statistics and demographics which define success...or not. But in the meantime, please enjoy the montages that I have created of pictures from the show that my friends have sent to me. I have to imagine that Boston's leadership team is already briefing the crew for the 2036 U.S. International Expo. One of the benchmark figures of these every-decade international shows has been the amount of money left over from one show which is handed over to the next team for their start-up funding in ten years hence.

Remember that this week is PSLC's spring auction. Auction slips have been emailed to all to guide you in your lot descriptions. Full details are on the first page of the club website. There will be several attractive donated lots on which you can bid, just over a couple dozen, I'm told. Details of the items and starting bids will be forthcoming. You don't want to miss it. If you have any non-member collecting friends who are interested in attending and participating in the auction, they may do so by joining the club on site at the meeting, and with this, they will be eligible to participate in the next several auctions.

And finally, a brief housekeeping note: Please let me know if you have any changes in your phone number, email address, and/or mailing address. I update the club roster regularly, as this document is a valuable tool for the club officers and planners. When one makes a demographic change, there are so many agencies to notify, and the stamp club may fall through the cracks. Please don't let this happen, as being able to contact you is important to us.

Looking forward to seeing many of you in a few days. Summer and the longest day of the year are quickly approaching!

This is our second in-house auction of 2026. The Society holds three (3) Auctions a year (January, June, and October). Participation in our auction is reserved for Society Members-only; however, anyone can become a member of the Society for \$10.00 on the night of an Auction. Material that our members bring for sale is generally broad in scope, from stamps, postal history, albums, ephemera, supplies, etc., and there is a variety of both international and U.S. There is always something for everyone at a reasonable price. Why not stop by, grab a paddle and have some fun with us?

Procedures:

Please register for a numbered paddle when you arrive. Place this number on all of your items to be auctioned and use this paddle during the auction when you are bidding. This will ensure that what you buy and what you sell are accurately credited and debited.

Be sure that all of your lots are accompanied by an accurate and detailed description, as this helps buyers to better understand what they are examining.

Auction lot description forms have been emailed and a limited number of hard copies will be available at the meeting. You may also access this form on the website at any time. You can make your own lot description forms, but please make sure that as much pertinent info as possible is included.

Fiscal transactions will be completed after the last lot has been sold. No early settlements will be made.

The Auction Committee recommends that you:

- Bring cash to pay for the items that you win
- Keep a running total during the auction of the items and prices of the lots that you sell and win
- Attach your sales information very securely to the lots you are entering into the auction. This will help avoid misidentification with other sellers' lots.

Bidding Rules:

- Minimum bids are \$1.00 per lot
- The minimum bidding increment is 50 cents.
- Only dues-paying PSLC members may participate in the auction.
- **Auction participants are limited to seven (7) lots.**

- You may also donate items to the auction, as donations are a welcomed, necessary source of funds for our operations, and help defray the cost of special events, storage lockers, newsletter, and website expenses, as well as advance deposits to secure special event locations.

The Whimsical World of Philatelic Artist John Coulthard

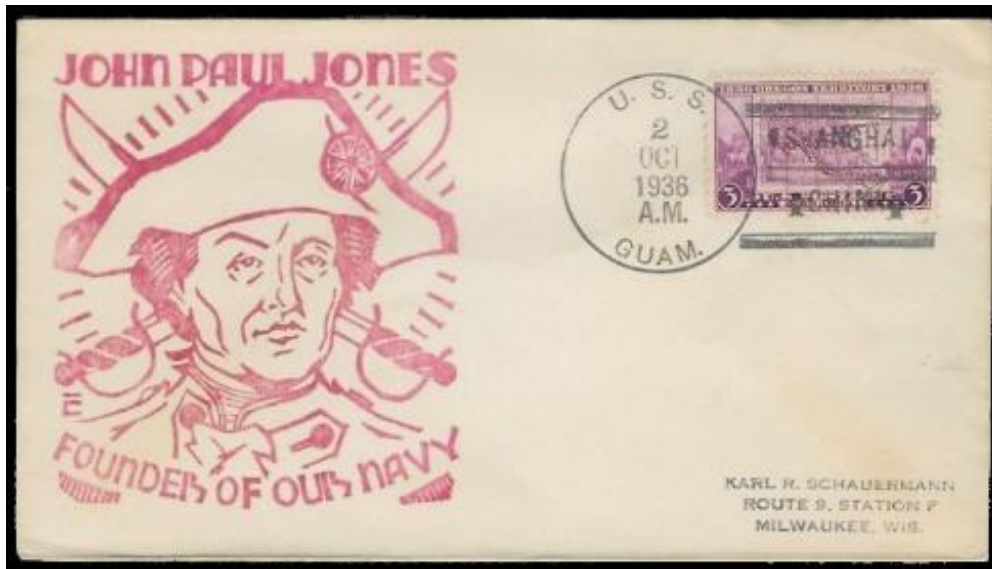
Meter strips, cachets, Cinderella stamps, philatelic advertising graphics...those were all impactful parts of the interesting life of artist John Coulthard. His collecting endeavors appeared in journals beginning in the 1930s, and Coulthard was active for nearly four decades, both in philately and advertising circles. His distinctive, delightful style made him well-recognized, and many of his various pursuits were grounded in expanding the awareness and recognition of stamp collecting.

Meter News and Notes

When meter strips were becoming more and more prevalent in the mails, Coulthard documented various usages. His regular column offered eye-catching artwork and the slogans featured with many of them. In the late 1930s, Coulthard created a set of 42 "Silly Town" poster stamps with names of actual places such as Mud, West Virginia, Gasoline, Texas and Horseshoe, Florida. The stamps were very popular items in the late 30's and into the 1940s. Collectors not only tried to compile sets, but were also attracted to fun postal history that had the funny labels on them.



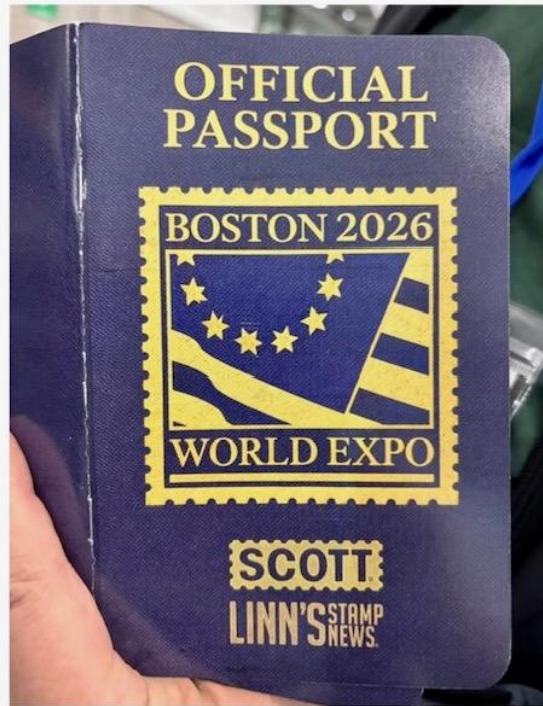
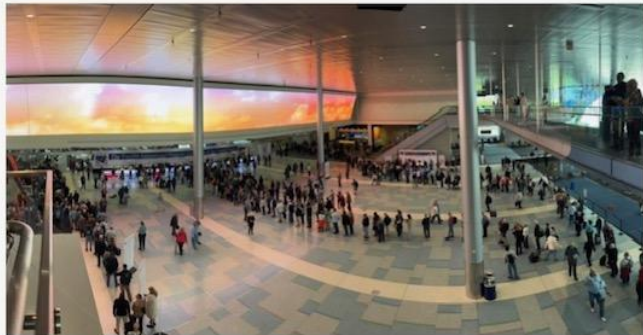
Coulthard also distributed thousands of event covers nationally with both serious and amusing cachets. That endeared him to collectors all across the philatelic spectrum. And when well-known stamp dealer Elmer Long wanted artwork to adorn his "Collector's Handbook" covers and be the focus of an ongoing advertising campaign, John Coulthard was chosen. The artist's work was the foundation of Long's brand for many years, not only for the drawings, but also the tongue in cheek banter accompanying them.



The fascinating story of John Coulthard's life will be shared in the PSLC zoom meeting on June 24th, open to all. This interesting, fast-paced presentation will show over 100 images of Coulthard's comical work and pictures of his stamp collecting contributions. Treat yourself to some philatelic fun!

PSLC Meeting Minutes

PSLC Meeting Minutes – May 13, 2026 – Landis Homes Attendance: 30 members and guests

Opening: On May 13, 2026, the Society held its regular monthly in-person meeting at Landis Homes. Members and guests began to gather about 6:30 PM to enjoy fellowship, refreshments, a bourse and giveaways. Society President Dr. Charles DiComo called the meeting to order at approximately 7:00 PM with a variety of greetings and announcements as well as numerous door prizes given by random drawing.

President DiComo introduced Dr. Ronald E. Majors as our feature presenter for the evening

Feature presentation: “The Decimal Era of Canadian Postal History” by Ronald E. Majors, OTB, PhD

Dr. Majors lectured on his award-winning exhibit, titled “The Decimal Era of Canadian Postal History.” The decimal era of Canadian postal history (1859-1868) took place after the pence era ended. Due to its proximity sharing a 5,500-mile border with loosely organized provincial governments and the Hudson Bay Company, Canada began to align itself to the United States and adopted the cents and dollar as its official currency. The US Civil War brought Canada provinces closer together on the issue of slavery, already forbidden throughout the British Empire since 1833. In fact, over 50,000 Canadians joined the Union Army and Navy with only a few joining the Confederate effort. Near the end of the decimal period, Confederation (1867) brought together the loosely held provincial districts. Later, other geographical entities such as British Columbia and Newfoundland joined the Confederation.

Other processes and changes to improve mail delivery throughout the decimal era took place. Special postal rates arose such as cross river ferriage rates, neighboring town rates, parcel post for small packages, soldier’s rates, photograph rates, and non-letter mail such as circular rates to improve business mail were instituted. Money letters were replaced with registered mail with more security features to allow closer tracking. To improve business results, the postal regulations allowed new and more innovative ways of advertising, using illustrated covers. Colorful and sometimes beautifully engraved envelopes promoted religious, patriotic, military, manufacturing and special interest-themes. But probably the biggest area of attention was the continued use of stampless covers, especially to exotic places for which postage rates were sometimes misunderstood or unknown. Often stampless covers help us understand the postal rates that were in effect at the time. It is estimated that approximately 50% of the mail was sent stampless and the postmasters at the recipient side of the mail business were entrusted to collect the “proper” postage for a given mailing destination. A small penalty

was imposed for the use of stampless letters. The talk gave an overview of Canadian decimal franked and stampless mail to some very rare and distant locations and rates.

Following the presentation, there was an active question and answer period. The meeting was adjourned at approximately 8:00 pm. Many stayed around for further conversation and camaraderie.

PSLC Meeting Minutes – May 27, 2026 - virtual mtg via Zoom Attendance: not available

Opening: The meeting was called to order at 6:30 PM. After a short period of greetings and announcements, Jim Haxby was introduced as the featured presenter for the evening.

Feature presentation: “Collecting National Airmail Week Material: More than Meets the Eye” by Dr. Jim Haxby

The title of Mr. Haxby’s presentation was “Collecting National Airmail Week Material: More Than Meets the Eye.” At first glance, the subject of National Air Mail Week (NAMW) philately seems simple enough. In 1938, numerous post offices around the country used rubber stamps to apply cachets of local significance to air mail covers that were dispatched during that special week in May 1938. But when we look a little deeper, we find that not all covers were quite so straightforward. Some towns had more than one cachet design. Some had a different cachet color for each day of the week. And sometimes a common cachet design was used throughout a particular county. Moreover, there was extensive correspondence between postmasters in which they traded separate impressions of the NAMW cachets. Jim’s presentation was a general introduction into the intriguing world of National Air Mail Week material.

After the presentation, the meeting was adjourned at approximately 7:45 PM.

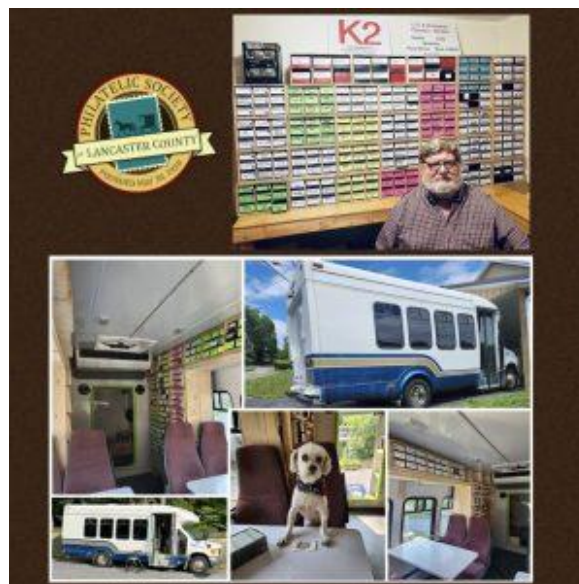
