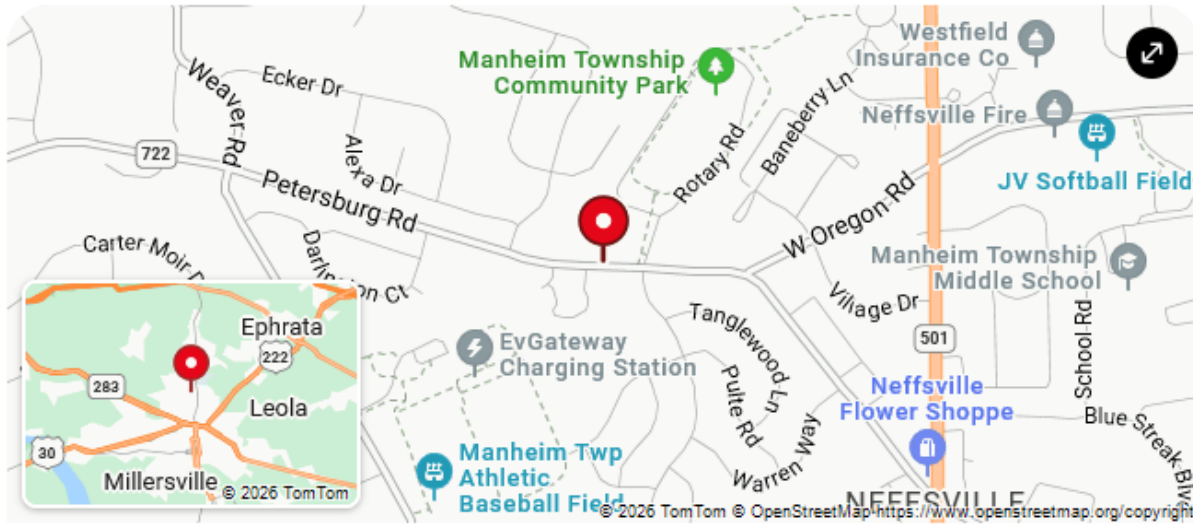

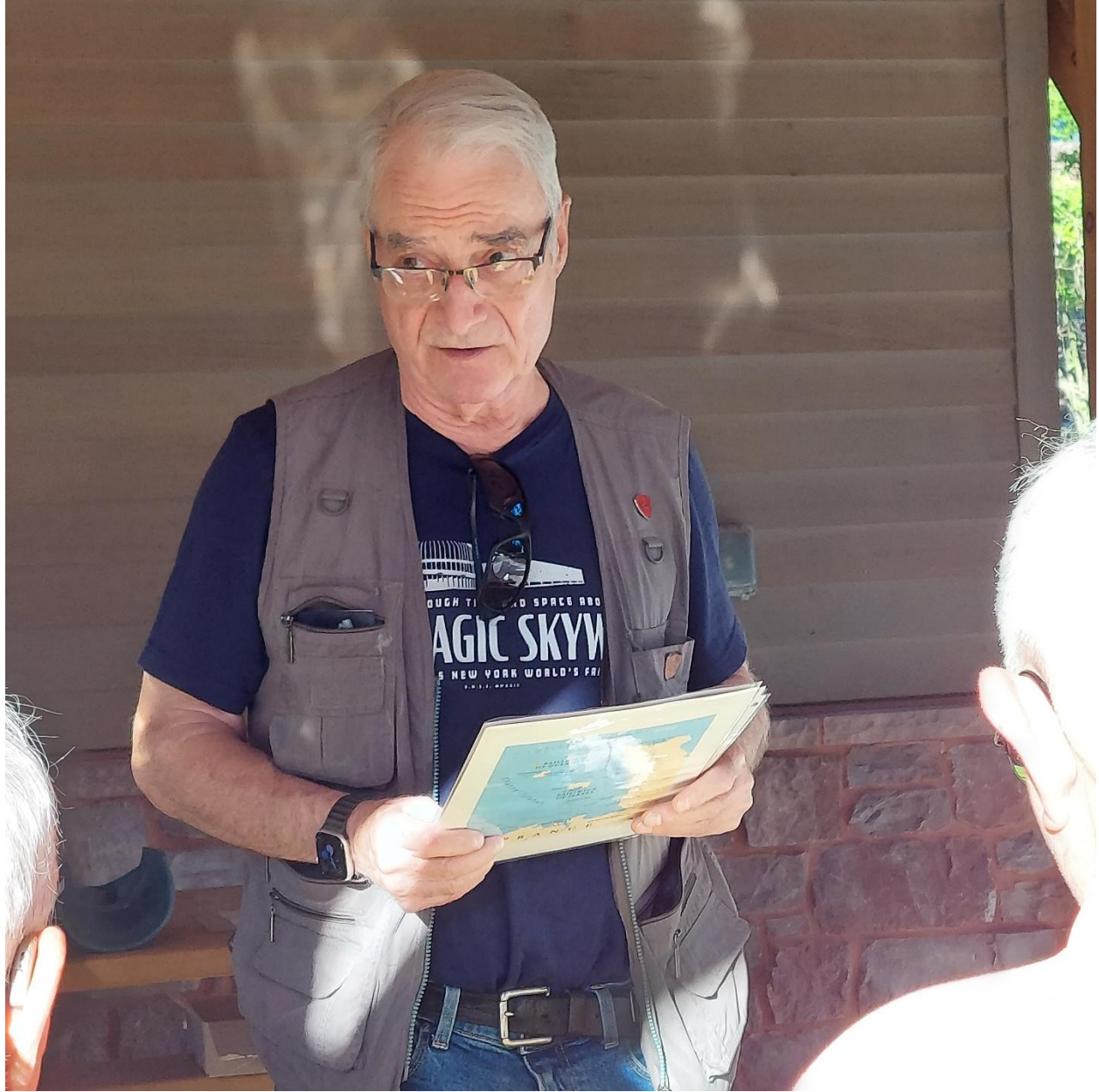

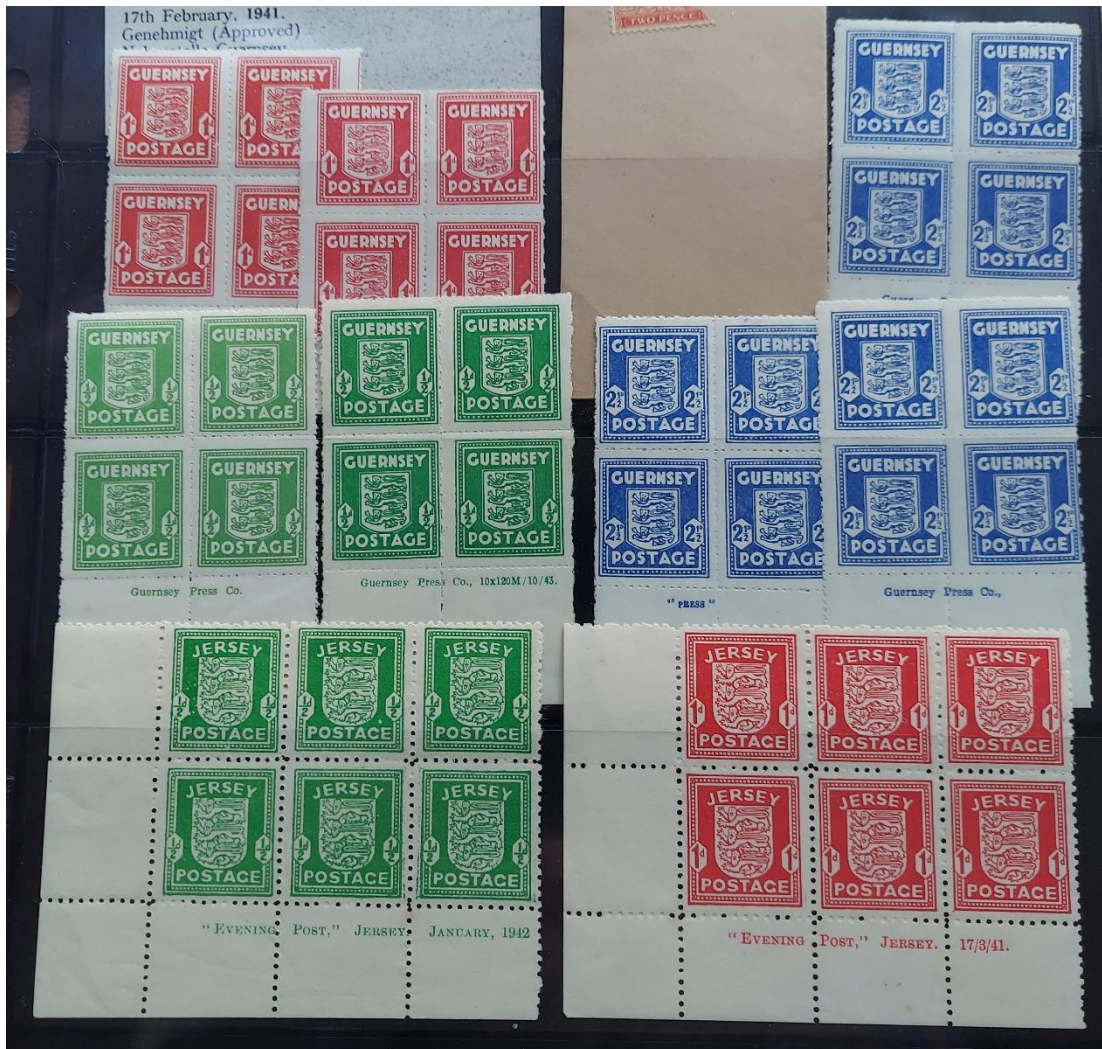


## **Our meeting in Cornwall**

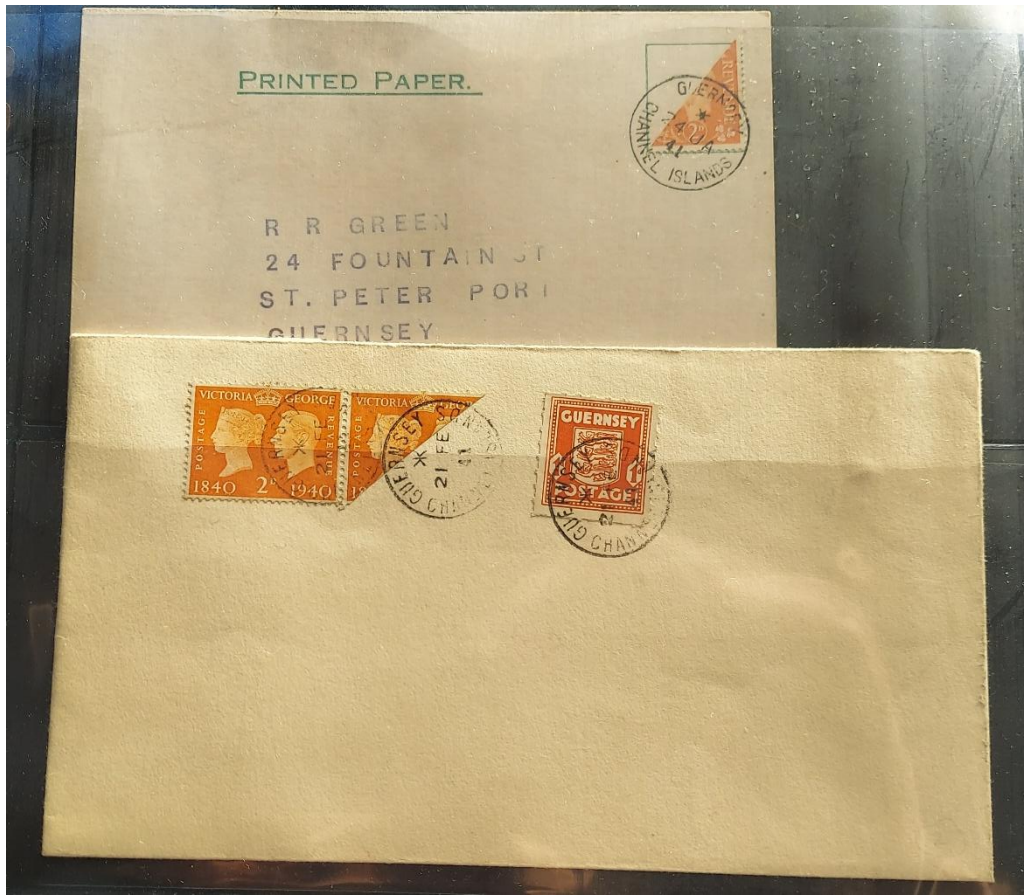

Back in 1742 when the Cornwall Iron Furnace began operations, Cornwall was in Lancaster County. George Washington was a lad of 10, and the author of our Declaration of Independence, Thomas Jefferson, wasn't even born yet. John Adams, who died on the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of our Independence in 1826, on the same day as his good friend and bitter rival Jefferson, was a seven-year-old boy learning grammar in Massachusetts. Adams was on his way to becoming a colonial lawyer, statesman, and our nation's second President, following the great General Washington, the man who refused to be a king.

This year Dr. Paul Petersen made the drive north to Cornwall to these historic wooded acres to share an evening with the Lebanon Stamp Collectors club at Cornwall Manor, hosted by Dennis and Lucy Shumaker. This year's weather was kinder to us than the last, and we had a sunny and pleasant evening listening to Paul share his collection of Channel Islands occupation stamps with us. Three guests from the Manor shared an evening of stamps and cookies with us at the bocce ball courts.



Channel Islands stamps are of special interest to collectors who pursue stamp issues related to World War II. The islands were occupied by Germany during the war, and Paul told us stories that are lurking behind these issues. He brought examples, such as the ones illustrated above, and showed several examples of their usage from his collection. He brought with him stamps containing several interesting features, such as secret marks that were quietly worked into the design in defiance of the occupiers.

# THE PRECANCELLED BATTLESHIP REPORT

## “Mountain Grove Vineyard” Missouri State University

This paper is concerned with a Battleship revenue stamp that was used by The Mountain Grove Vineyard (Figure 1). The stamp is a 2-cent proprietary revenue (RB27r) from the Spanish-American War Battleship series that was used by the vineyard in 1899.

The stamp shown in Figure 1 is an example of very early usage of a 2-cent proprietary Battleship shortly after the vineyard was established. There is no reference to Mountain Grove in Chappell and Joyce [1], so we can conclude that they probably did not employ a printed precancel on Battleship revenues of this generation. Perhaps, the volume of their business in those days did not justify the use of such a cancel. Nevertheless, this was a thriving business that continues today.

Mountain Grove Vineyard was established in 1899. It is now a part of the William H. Darr School of Agriculture at the Missouri State University. One of the early university buildings is shown in Figure 2.

Mountain Grove Cellars is licensed for wine sales and includes a licensed distillery. The college produces a variety of grapes from several locations on the property. Their wines are produced from their own grapes, which is a contrast to some larger vineyards that bring grapes in from other locations to bottle on their property, Figure 3.

Located near the Ozark Mountains, picturesque Mountain Grove, Missouri, Figures 4 and 5, has become a popular tourist destination. The *Brown Derby International Wine Center* in Springfield, Missouri, offers the wine lover a stock of more than 4000 wines, as well as a broad selection of spirits.

It was surprising to find that the cancel on the battleship revenue shown in Figure 1 was from a vineyard in Missouri. We expected to find *Mountain Grove Vineyard* on the west coast, where most of the wine producing states are located. Yet, this vineyard in Missouri thrives today with a rich history as part of the School of Agriculture at the Missouri State University.

### The American Revenuer

#### “The Cardinal Match Co. #RO57d, 1¢ Lake Illegally Used on U.S. Postal Card #UX4 or #UX5.

#### Cardinal Match Co. 1¢ Used on U.S. Postal Card

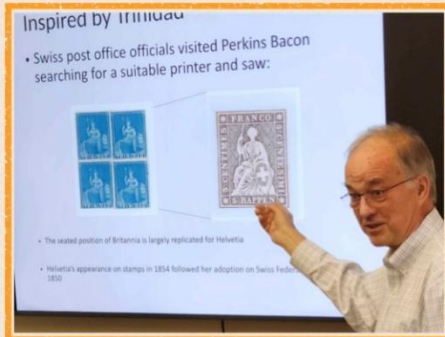

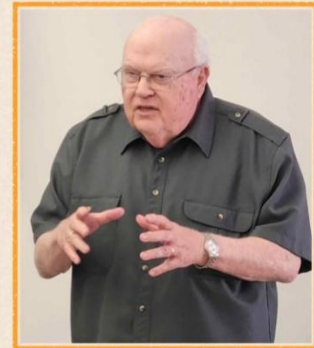
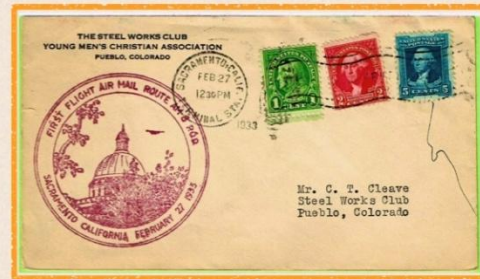

On June 20, 2026, the Philatelic Gathering met at the CCHC in a newly refurbished conference room with computer projection capability for PowerPoint programs.




The first speaker was Bruce Marsden who talked about Switzerland's "Strubels," the imperforate Sitting Helvetia issues of 1854 to 1863. He described the origins of the stamp design, the denominations, and the various printings at Munich and Bern. These were followed by uses including printed matter and foreign destinations.

The second speaker was Bill Schultz who showed some of the many, many covers he has acquired over the years, cancelled on his birthday date of February 27. At the same time, he explained how rates changed over the years from the stampless period to modern times. A wide variety of uses were seen including receipts and other documents, two different U.S. first day covers, censored mail, a first trip of a Highway Post Office, and even a dated revenue stamp. Bill emphasized that such a collection can be developed at relatively low cost.
